## Zoning by-law approved flood land rule temporary

Whoops-Milton's new zoning by-law has been permanently approved-not temporarily as was stated in a front page story in last week's Champion.

The town's zoning by-law No. 31-69 has been approved as drafted. What is temporary is a subsidiary amending by-law, No. 6-70 which freezes all lands in the flood plain within the town boundaries awaiting the outcome of a study of creek lands presently being carried out by Halton Region Conservation Authority and the Town of Milton. Results of that study are expected to be filed soon. The

Ontario Municipal Board put the freeze on flood plain lands until Feb. 1, 1970 and that was the bylaw which received "temporary" OMB approval.
