Dog Snatchers?

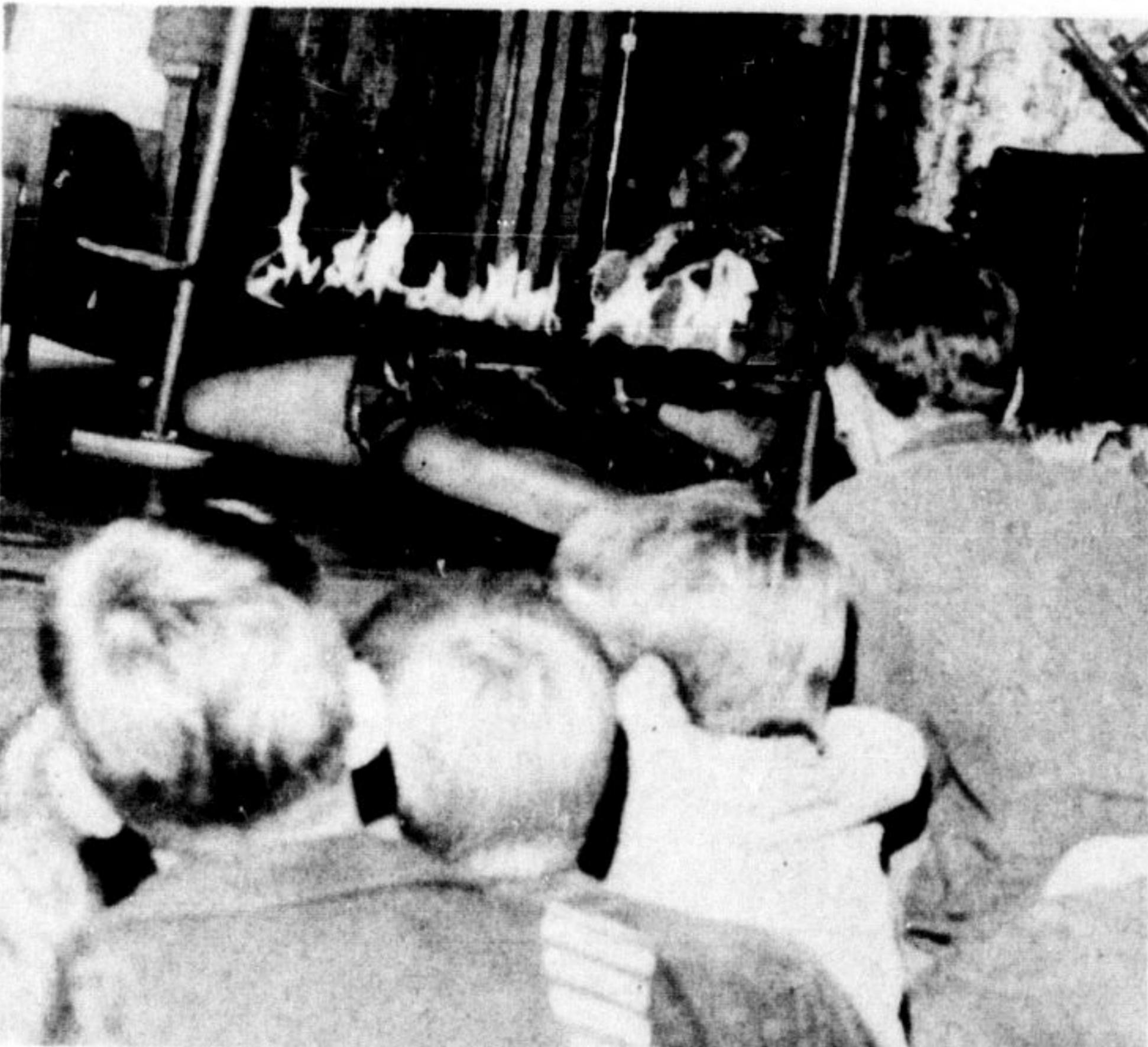
