Time to take soil samples

Now is the time to take soil samples to determine fertilizer needs for crops to be planted next spring. In recent years more farmers have been applying their phosphorus and potassium requirements in the fall to save time during the busy spring.

Research has shown that phosphorus and potassium are quite stable in the soil over winter with a minimum of fertilizer loss. Nitrogen, on the other hand, when applied in the fall is leached readily. Nitrogen should therefore not be applied until spring. Areas of heavy run-off and wash-out should be avoided for fall fertilization since all nutrients along with soil particles can be moved by large volumes of water.

Better in fall Farmers often find that fertilizer suppliers can give better service in the fall when the demand for fertilizer and fertilizer spreading equipment is not so great.




