Manor doctor asked to resign position

A long-standing difference of opinion came to a head last week when Dr. J. W. McCutcheon of Milton and the Halton Centennial Manor Board of Management decided to part company. Dr. McCutcheon, who has been the home's physician for nine years, was asked to resign by the board.

The dispute centred around periodic health examinations. In June the doctor was asked by the Manor board to bring the residents' records up to date and to see that every resident had at least one thorough examination each year. This had not been done in the past but was required by the provincial government.

Wednesday at a board meeting Dr. McCutcheon reported to the committee and offered a proposal that he felt would meet the needs.

He suggested residents should be made aware that the health examination was available and what it includes. He said residents should have the privilege to accept or decline the examination and if they accepted, they should be given the choice of having their own doctor or the home physician do the exam.

Dr. McCutcheon said there was far too much paper work involved to give each resident a thorough examination. He said he was 65 years old and the board should consider a younger man. He noted the board might be wise, if it did not hire a younger man, to hire a semi-retired man on a full time basis.

Dr. McCutcheon will resign effective Oct. 30. He was paid \$14,000 a year on a part time basis. While the board and residents were happy with the medical treatment and medical advice, the dissatisfaction centred on the annual examination and reports.
