His entries included grand champion bull and reserve, grand champion female, plus six firsts, one second and two thirds. Maurice Sisler, Brantford claimed two firsts, six seconds plus reserve champion female and best breeder's herd of four animals.

Peacock is winner in D. P. Shorthorns

Clarence Peacock, R.R. 4 Milton claimed the most prizes Saturday in Milton Fair's Dual Purpose Shorthorn competition. His entries included the grand champion female, reserve champion bull and best breeder's herd, and won six first prize ribbons plus one third.

Entries of William D. A. Smith of Guelph claimed one first, three seconds and four thirds plus the grand champion bull award and second prize for breeder's herd. Allan Patterson and Sons, R.R. 1 Milton had one first, five seconds and two thirds plus the reserve champion cow and third in breeder's herd.

Horning wins most prizes fruit classes

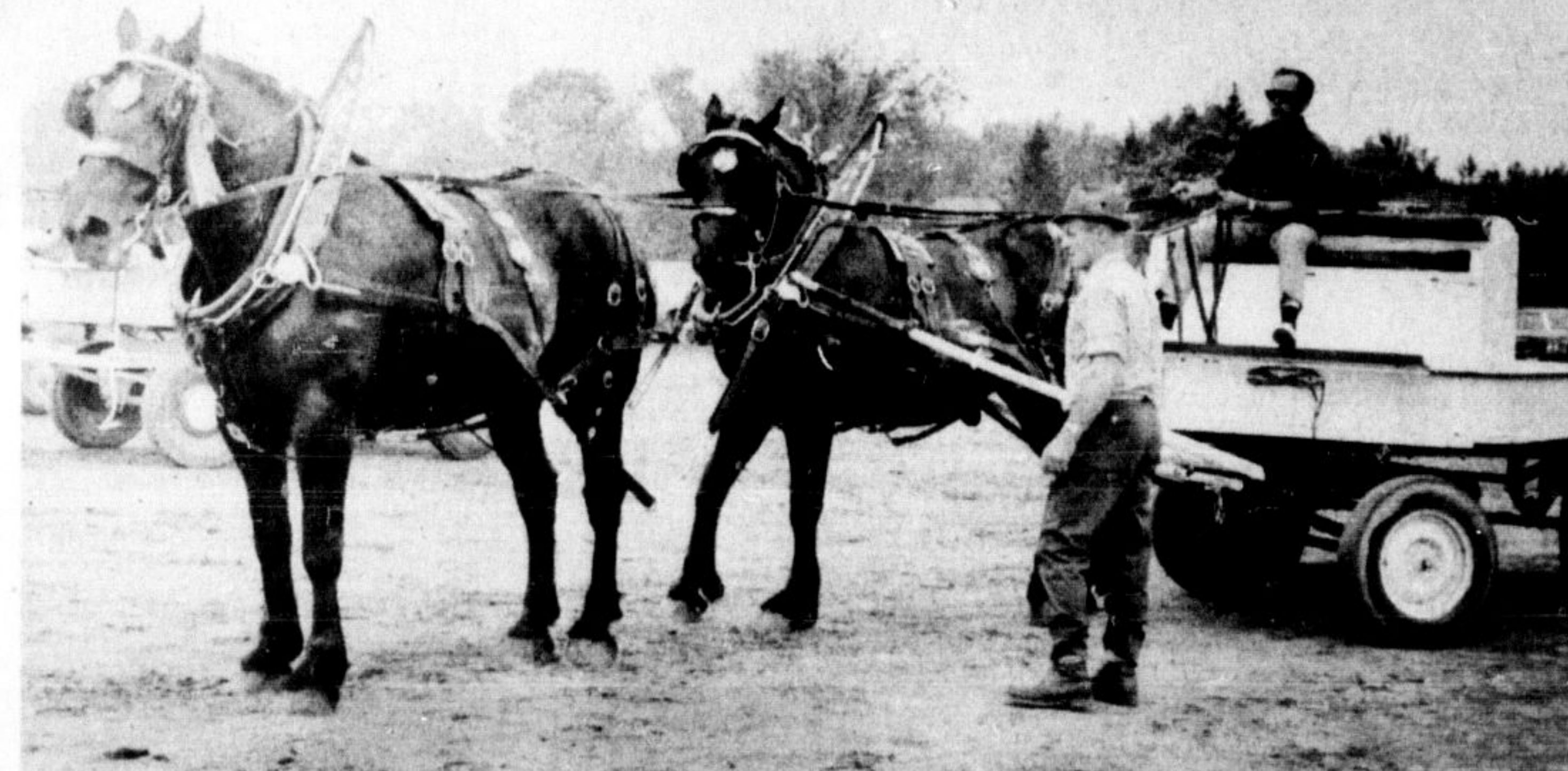

Forester, Burlington, two firsts; Bryan Marshall, R.R. 4 Milton, two seconds; Peter Hutchinson, R.R. 2 Milton, two seconds; Debbie Hutchinson, R.R. 2 Milton, one third. Judge W. H. Drummond had a variety of fruits to judge in the plum, pear and apple classes.

S. May wins heavy horses

Most prizes in the heavy horse competitions at Milton Fair went to Stan May of R.R. 2 Hornby with seven firsts, two seconds and one third place ribbon.

Bev Little of Shelburne won three firsts, two seconds and one third; Lloyd G. Stokes of Campbellville three firsts and two seconds; Rayner Bros. of R.R. 1 Milton three firsts and one third. Judge Ivan E. Taylor split the prize between Stokes, May and Little in the class for the best six horse team while May and Stokes split the first prize in the four horse team class.

Championships and prizes were fairly evenly divided among four exhibitors in the Guernsey cattle show at Milton Fair.

Dr. R. D. Kunica of R.R. 2 Georgetown showed the champion bull and reserve champion female and took home four firsts, one second and two thirds. Mel McCullough, Acton had the reserve champion bull plus two firsts and five second prize ribbons.

The entries of John Y. McNabb, Georgetown claimed grand champion female award plus two firsts, one second and three thirds. H. L. Pickering of Oakville had one third prize.

In the class for best uddered cow, McNabb's entry was first and Kunica's second.

Six herds in Angus

Six exhibitors contested 23 prizes in the Angus contest at Milton Fair on Saturday, with as many as nine animals entered in some classes.

Bruce Reed of Meadowvale showed the grand champion female with the reserve prize going to Wilmo Farms of Milton. Wilmo also took reserve in the grand champion bull class when Torr-Head Farms (Ron Wilson and Son) Rockwood claimed the top award. Other exhibitors were Thomas Smith of Guelph, Badenock Farms of Puslinch and Tom Jackson of Caledon.

Shorthorn contest has two entrants

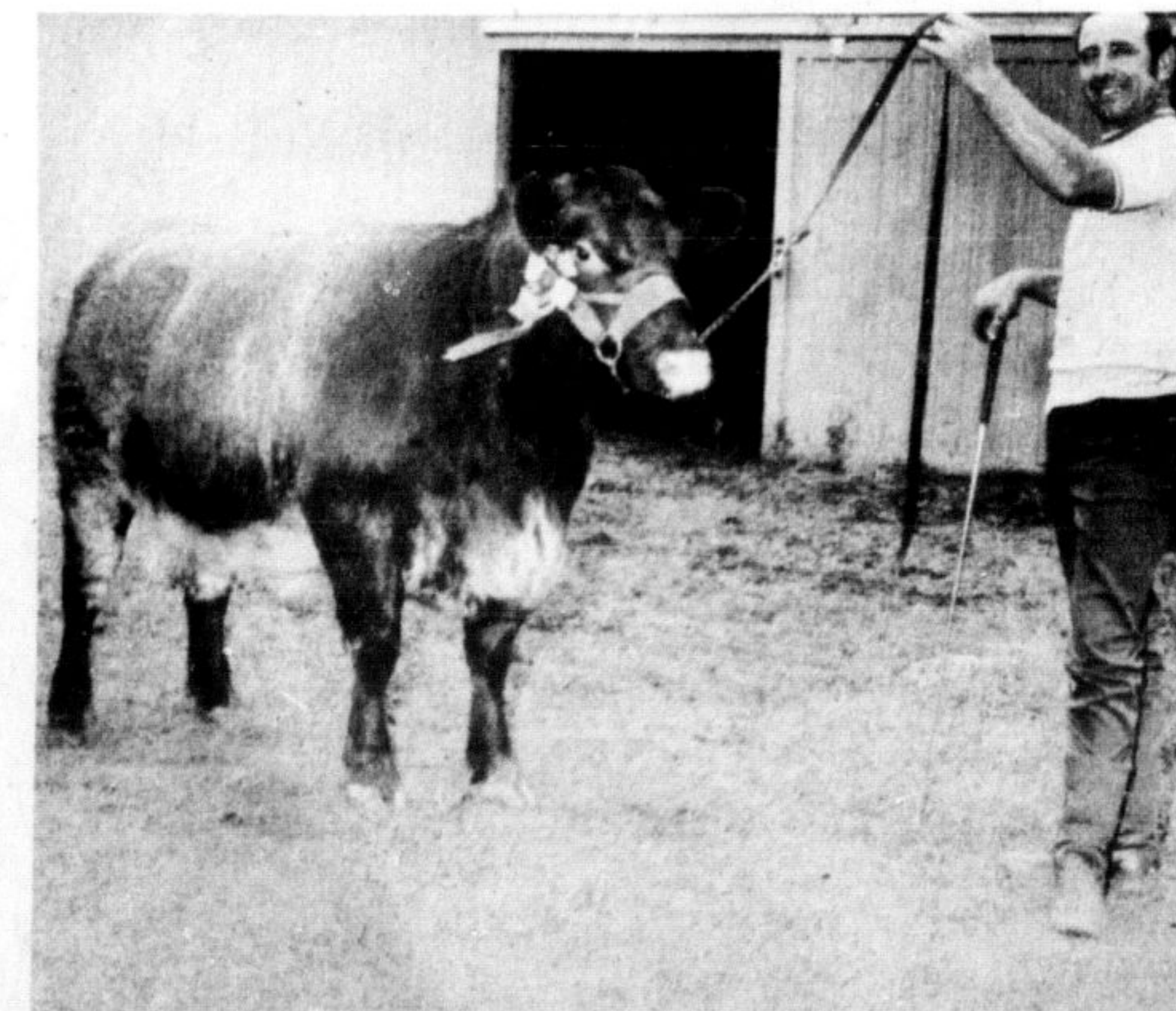
