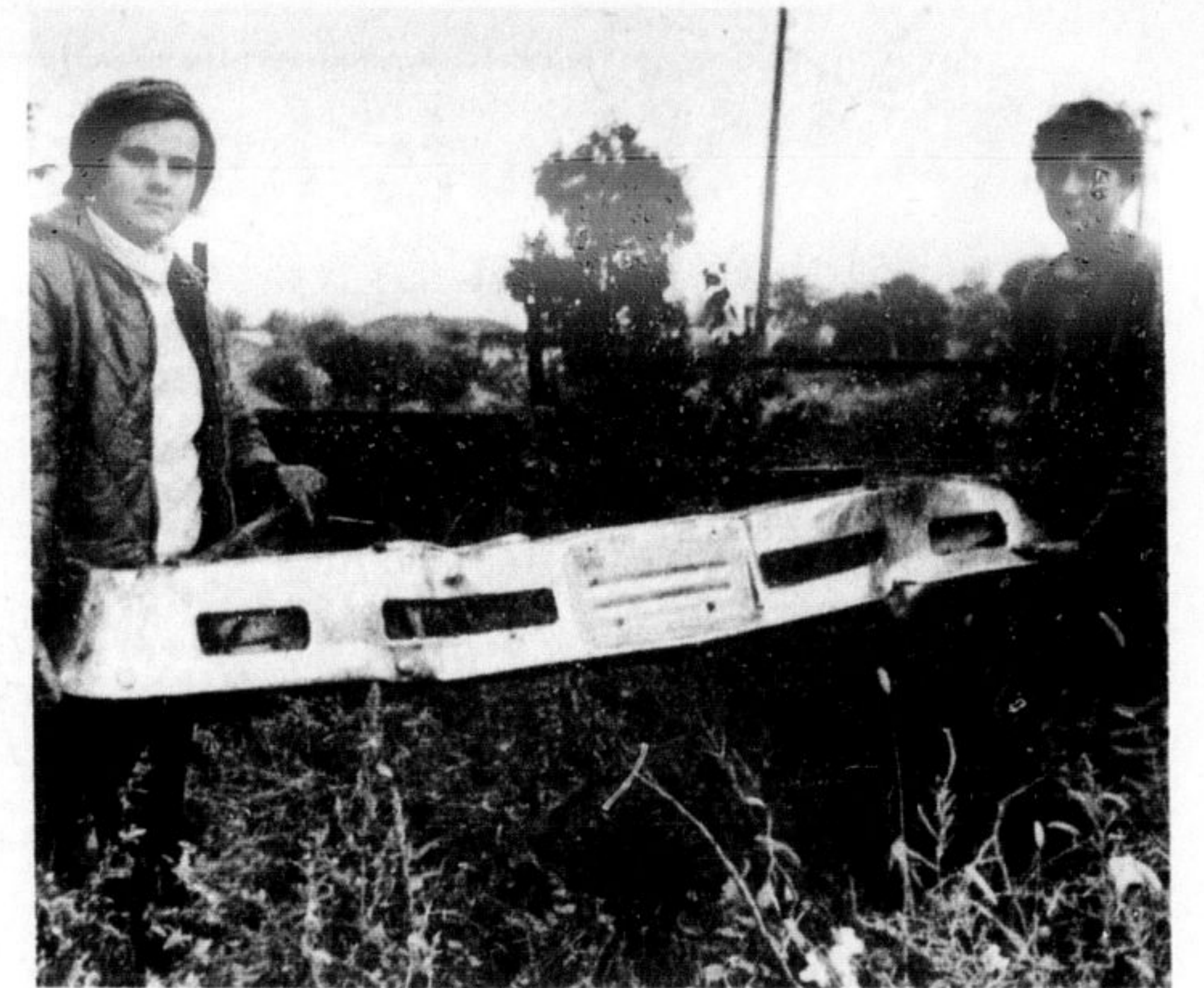
"We hope to be able to donate a new room or appliance with the money raised," said Mr. Schofield. "The group deserves a round of credit."

**Planners emphasize need for more sewage treatment**

Milton Council should begin immediately to prepare engineering reports for future sewage treatment facilities, according to Milton Planning Board.

The Board noted that development now at various

stages of completion would cause a demand for sewage treatment for an additional 15,000 to 17,000 people.

Members of planning board noted that with projects the board deems to be under construction within the next few months, the current facilities will be used to capacity.

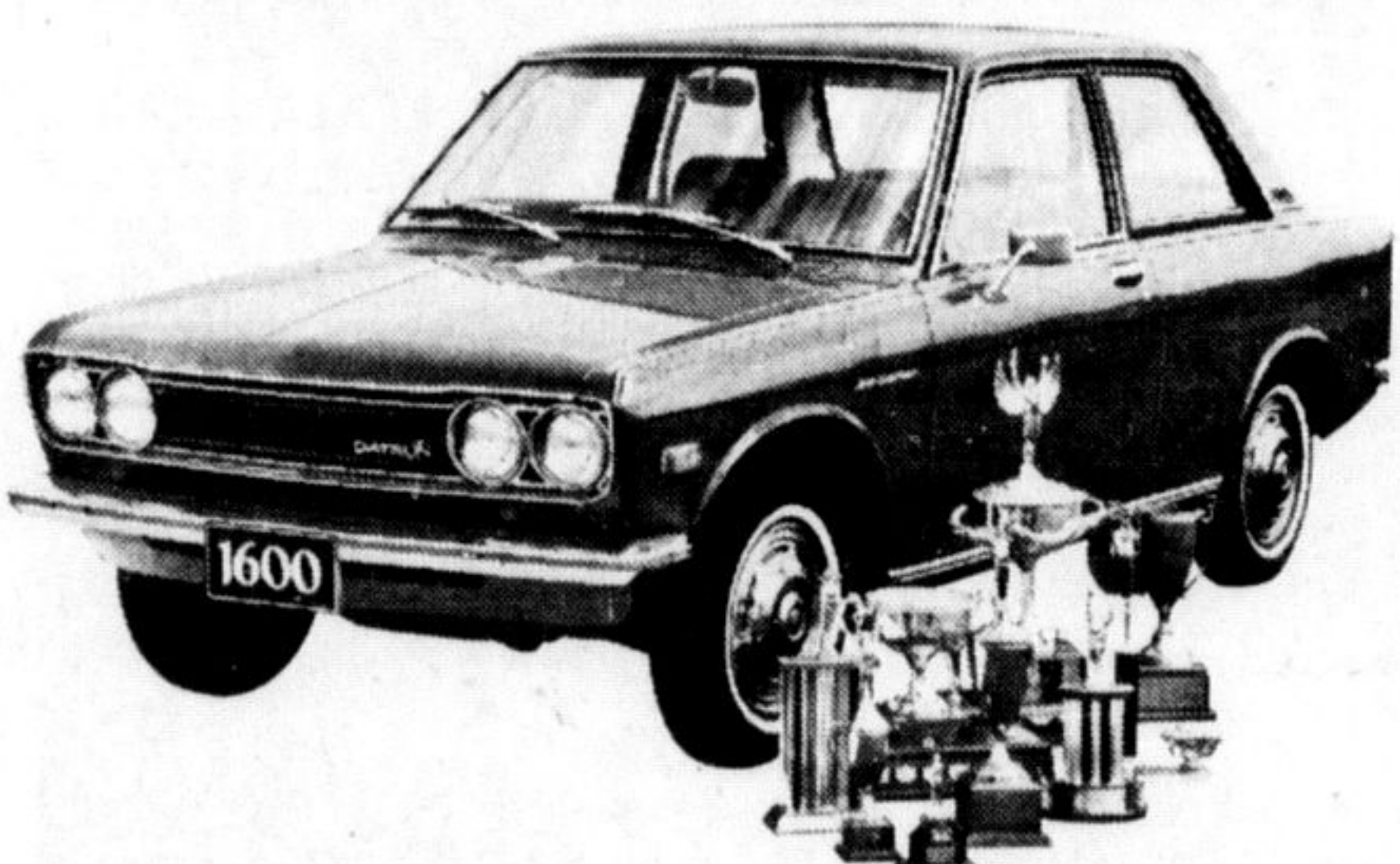
