In the Senior 4-H Holstein Heifer Calf Class, with 29 entries, Mary McGee placed third, Bob MacDonald fourth, Barry Reid fifth, David Reid eighth, Paul Stewart tenth. In the Junior Holstein class, with 17 entries, the winner was Charles Cocklin with Cathy O'Hearn third, Gary Patterson seventh, Bruce McGee eighth.  
All the Jerseys came from Halton, with the winner in the Senior Jersey Calf Class being Valerie Ella, closely followed by Bruce McKee, Jane, John and Carol Nixon. Marg Robinson had the top Junior Jersey.

**Group of three**  
The highlight of the 4-H dairy calf club show on Saturday was the group of three dairy calves from any one 4-H calf club. The Halton 4-H Holstein Calf Club, for the fifth time out of six years, won this with the members Paul Stewart, Barry Reid and David Reid. The third prize group was also from the Halton 4-H Holstein Calf Club with members Charles Cocklin, Mary McGee and Bob

MacDonald, as was the sixth prize group with Bruce McGee, Gary Patterson and Cathy O'Hearn.

On Monday the 4-H Beef Inter-Club classes were held. In the Aberdeen-Angus Steer Class Joe Willmott placed third. The Shorthorn section was dominated by Halton County with David

McKinnon winning the Shorthorn Steer class, followed by Doug Gardhouse, Bob Lasby and Cathy Lasby. Keith Aitken was 7th. David McKinnon and Doug Gardhouse also were the winner and reserve in the open Shorthorn Steer class. In the Shorthorn Heifer class Keith McKinnon was first with Bill Lasby second.

The Group of three 4-H Beef Calf Class also went to Halton County with the Halton 4-H Beef Calf Club group of David McKinnon, Doug Gardhouse, and Joe Willmott. The Acton 4-H Calf Club placed fourth with Cathy, Bill and Bob Lasby.  
In the 4-H Grain Classes, Sharon Leslie of the Acton 4-H

Field Crop Club won the Simpsons Sears Trophy for the champion exhibit of barley. Her sisters Norma and Leah also placed in the first prize group.

In the Oat section Keith Aitken, David Taylor and Ken McNabi placed in the first prize group. In the 4-H Corn classes John Nurse had the top exhibit of corn but was ineligible to win the trophy as he won it last year. Bill Stokes had the winning Winter Wheat exhibit.
