Christmas spirit? Well, this is just what the doctor ordered. So come along and bring a cushion. No! it's to sit on!

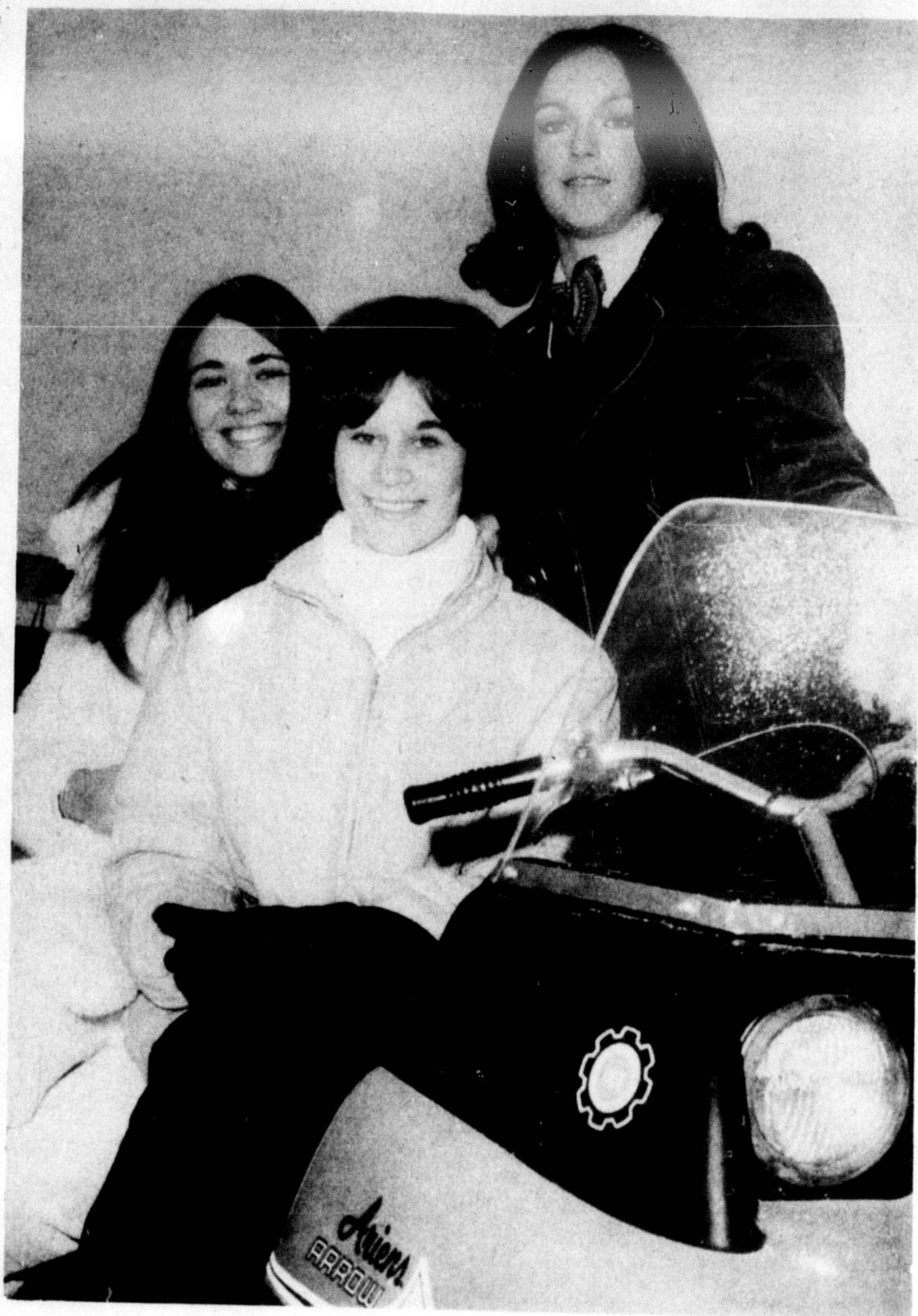
