Wessell Gall. another candidate for the reeve's position, was definitely opposed to any form of amalgamation with the city of Hamilton. "I am convinced that Burlington has the land area and other resources to permit it to remain independent of surrounding municipalities, while at the same time sharing with them the responsibility of administering county affairs," said the candidate.

"I plan larger participation in recreational and public works areas if elected," he said, "and I appreciate the experience I have received serving on council in the

"It is imperative that the voters of Burlington send responsible, vigorous and capable representatives to county council, representatives who are able to reflect the wishes and views of the residents of Burlington in a strong, yet

"My stand on Regional government is to keep Burlington the way it is now-in Halton County only," said James Swanborough. "Last year the question on ballot gave us a choice between the Peel-Mississauga area or the Hamilton-Wentworth area, but since the government has obviously just been putting out feelers and no decision is going to be made, I say we can fight for everybody's choice-Burlington

and Halton." All the ingredients He added that Halton County is

Burlington and Oakville should one viable unit with the Halton County Board of Education "which is working well". "We have our Halton Region Conservation Authority within our watershed in Halton County, we are large enough in population and acreage to form our own region and we have a good blending of rural, urban and industrial living." He stressed the industrial ratio is on the low side but said "we won't sell out our environment and clean living merely to make a few tax

"To look at this plan honestly developers, builders and land speculators—a man who does not own land or is speculating in land in Halton County, especially here in north Burlington. The County Roads Committee needs new life, a people's representative who will speak up when the staff or the province propose to build superhighways through our quiet, rural area and someone who will speak up on traffic control and speeding on our roads to bring peace and tranquility back to the north."

"Thus I have arranged my business to devote all the time necessary to act as your reeve," said the councillor.

Unwelcome A short question and answer forum followed the candidates' speeches. Main questions thrown at the candidates were the problem of replacing trees in the Cedar Springs area once construction is completed and a concerned ratepayer wondered why guests at county council were made to feel unwelcome. In reply to the question on trees Reeve Gallagher stated the trees

Ella Foote noted that planting would be started in early spring. As for the question of representation on county council Mr. Swanborough stressed that meetings should not be closed and the "cards should be laid on the table".

"Halton County is one of the most economic units in Ontario," said school board trustee George Pelletterio. Mr. Pelletterio also thanked ratepayers for their confidence and added "the cost per person for education is lower in the county than anywhere else in Untario".

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
