North Oakville backs Day Anderson wins mayoralty

Final figures show north Oakville voters would have preferred a new mayor when they went to the polls last week. Allan Day polled 382 votes compared to 296 in favor of Mayor McLean Anderson and 248 for Laurie Mannell, in the Ward One area north of Highway 5.

The rest of Oakville didn't quite see things that way though. The town gave Anderson a strong

mandate to continue as mayor. Favor Gillies, Drew-Brooke In the reeve's race the north ward was split but favored the North ward by four votes. Gillies polled 463 compared to 459 for Bill Masson. Masson won the race when votes from the whole town were counted.

Ward One threw heavy support behind Geoff Drew-Brook with 611 votes compared to 327 for

Harry Barrett. Barrett beat Drew-Brook in every other ward with especially strong support in Ward Four.

Richard Day led the polls for councillor in Ward One with 587 votes. Incumbent Don Gordon was re-elected with 582 votes. Ken Giles received support from 295 people and Jack Hardiman tallied 189 votes in the final analysis.
