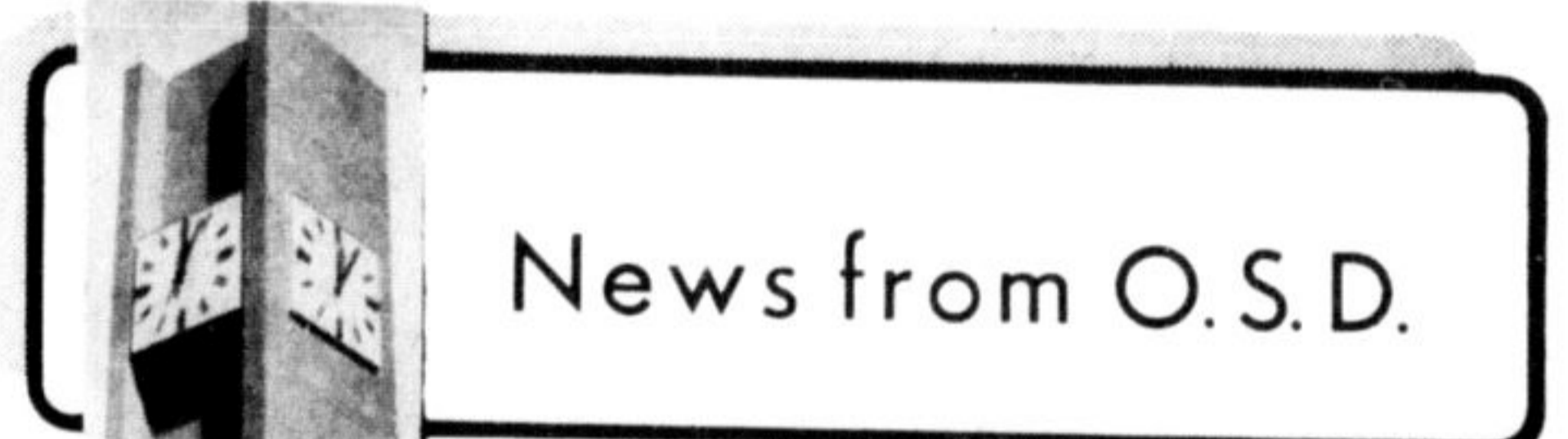
Easy to sell "The project worked really great," said Student Council president Susan Pearce. "They were easy to sell and sales were so great, we ordered 50 dozen more."

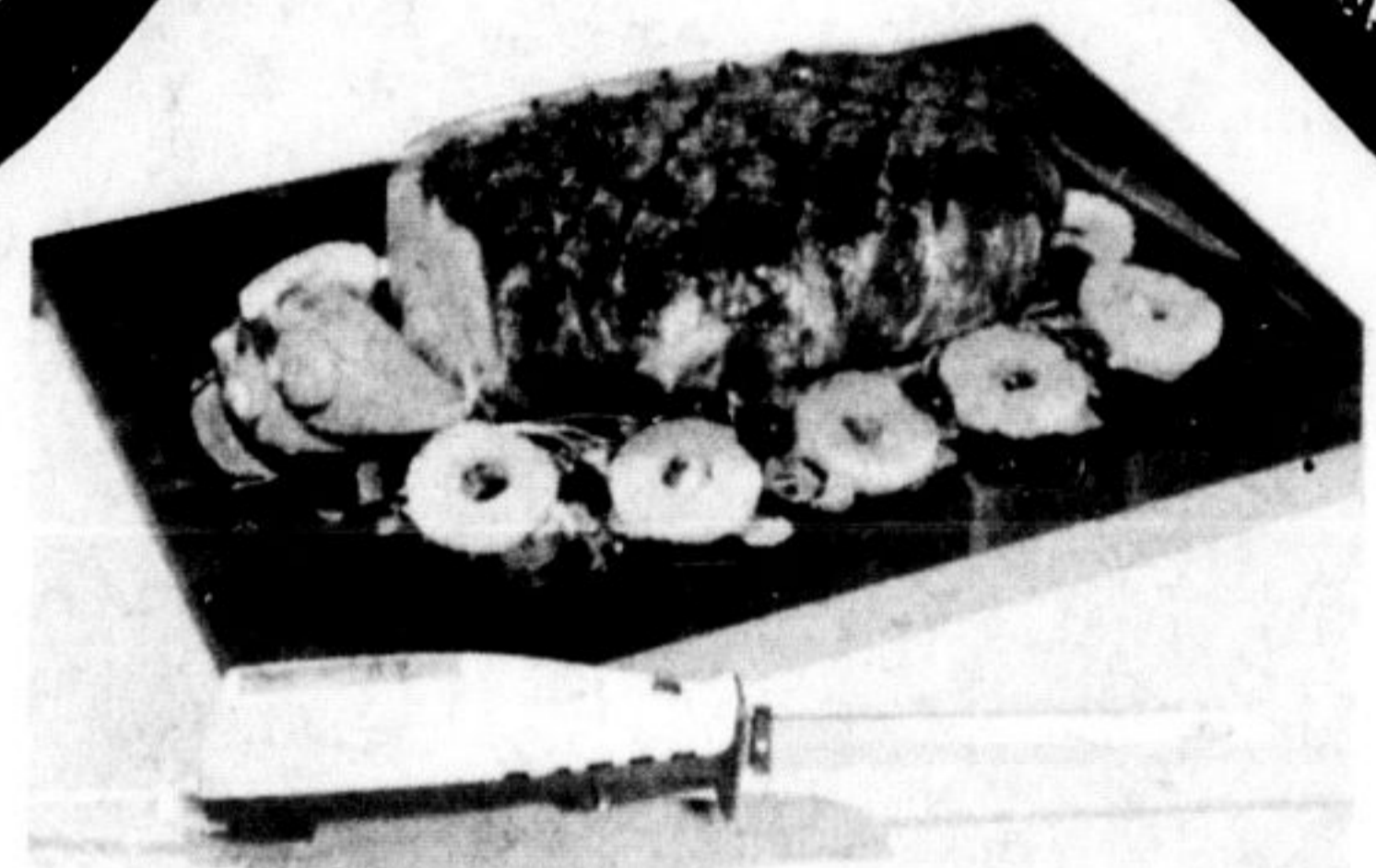
