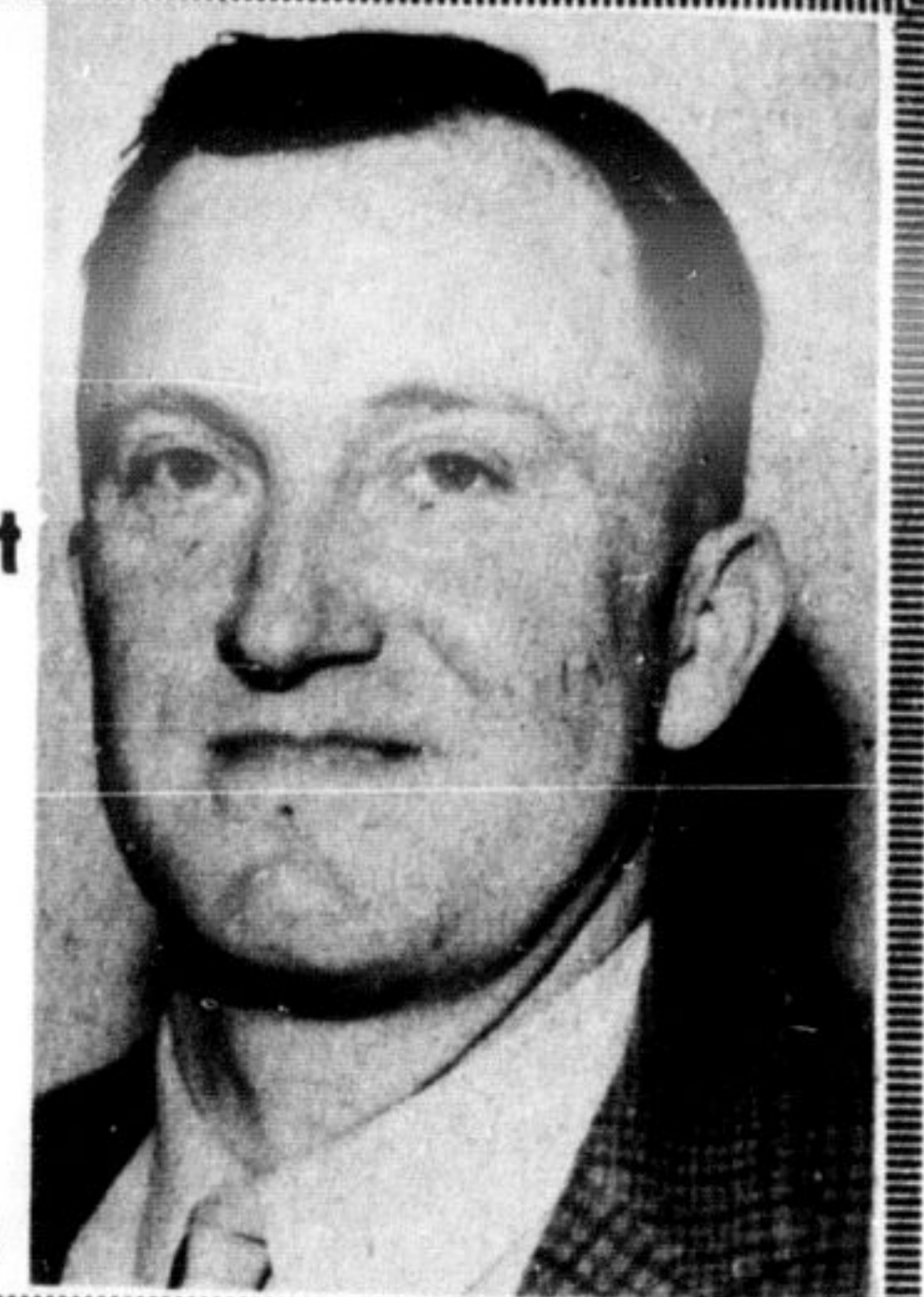
will again represent the separate school ratepayers on the public board. Both men are from Burlington.
