



### Milton Council Briefs

During their final meeting of 1970, held Monday Dec. 21, members of Milton Council:

—Approved an extra expenditure of \$1,470 on Halton Region Conservation Authority's flood control report for Milton, for work done in planning future needs for an area west of town; however council balked and refused to pay its share of a \$700 extra for the establishment of a "fill line". The Authority report will give the town a flood line beside all creeks, in which no development will be possible and to which the town is agreeable. But the fill line was an unnecessary extra, councillors said.

—Authorized final payment to Craftwood Construction on the holdback for last year's main trunk sewer project, in the amount of \$14,750.

—Set speed limits of 50 miles per hour on Highway 25 from Base Line Rd. to Highway 401 and from Derry Rd. to a point 1,900 feet north.

—Decided to hold their first meeting of the new year on Jan. 4.

—Asked the Works Committee and town engineers to investigate a request from Bell Bros. Garage to erect a sign for an automatic carwash on Martin St. The sign would sit one foot from the road, 160 feet south of Base Line Rd. and would be 27 feet high. Councillors felt the sign should be held back at least 10 feet from the road.

—Agreed with Milton Planning Board's recommendation that nursery schools be allowed in R3 or R4 residential zones, with each to be considered on its own merits.

—Decided to prepare a by-law to rezone the present Milton Greenhouses property from C3 to C1 Commercial, to allow offices and stores. The property is being purchased by Mrs. Pauline Ollen.

—Agreed to rezone the site of two 14-storey apartments totalling 200 suites on Millside Dr. to R7 to permit high density development. The land is currently in a development zone.

—Accepted an offer of Wolford Construction, Guelph, to tear down a Mary St. house at a cost of \$1,000. The property was purchased by the town for parking lots. Work is to be completed by Jan. 31.

—Decided to suggest a meeting with Halton County Board of Education to discuss the police chief's proposal for a circular driveway at J. M. Denyes public school. Chief Ray Andress suggested the drive would eliminate a traffic hazard when parents drop children off for school on Thomas St.

—Received a request from Milton Chamber of Commerce to have directional signs for the plaza and downtown business section erected on main roads into Milton. The works superintendent was to be asked if the necessary wording could be incorporated in new "truck route" signs to be erected along Highway 25.

—Learned Halton East MPP Jim Snow is attempting to have "food and fuel" signs erected near Milton on Highway 401.

—Asked the clerk and building inspector to check the lot lines at the Fallingbrooke Park where some backyard fences have been erected on park property.

—Accepted the resignation of E. B. Clements from the parks and recreation committee at the
