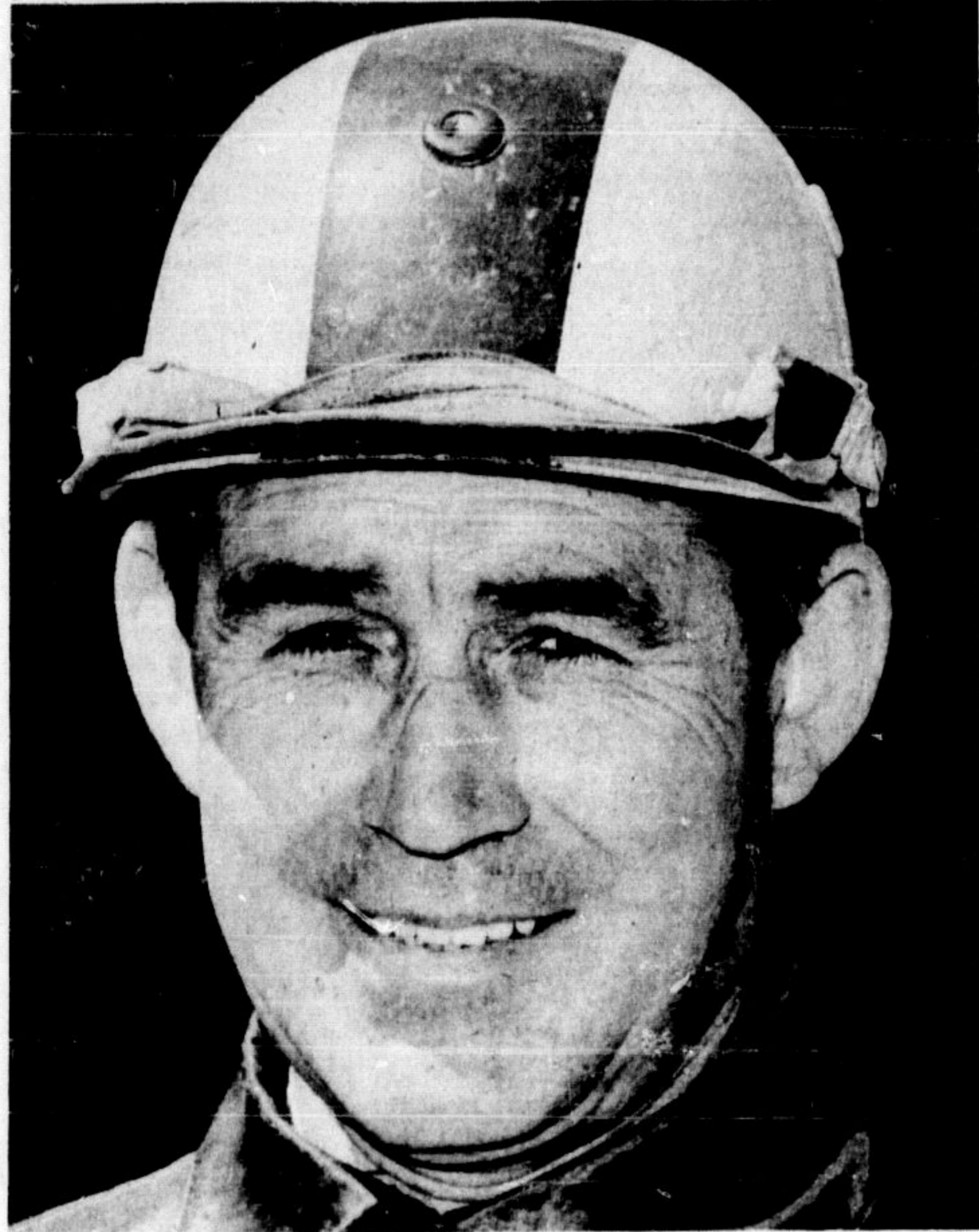


# Dr. Russ Furness voted good guy

For the second straight year a Milton reinsman has been voted Good Guy of the year on the Golden Horseshoe Circuit. The 1970 Good Guy Award goes to Dr. Russ Furness, one of the circuit's leading horsemen. Jimmy Holmes of Milton capped the Good Guy prize in 1969.

Dr. Furness, who won 62 races and \$120,642 in purses on the Golden Horseshoe Circuit's three-track tour of Greenwood, Mohawk and Garden City raceways in 1970. The award will be formally presented to Dr. Furness at the Ontario Harness Horsemen's Association annual dinner-dance scheduled tonight (Wednesday) at the Skyline Hotel in Rexdale.

During their first meeting of the new year Monday, members of Milton Council:

—Learned the clerk was polling the downtown merchants this week to see if there are any objections to closing Main St. between the Martin and James Sts. on the afternoon and evening of Feb. 11 for a shopping mall in connection with the Milton Winter Carnival.

—Gave final readings to a by-law banning parking on the south side of Mill St. from James to Elizabeth Sts.; and on Mary St. on the south side from Bell to Bronte Sts.

—Appointed J. S. Edgar of Ontario Steel Products to fill a vacant seat on Milton Industrial Commission for 1971.

—Named William Doherty to Milton Arena Board for 1971, to replace Colin Smillie who resigned.

—Proclaimed the week of Feb. 7 to 14 as Milton Winter Carnival week, and the week of Feb. 21 to 28 as Boy Scout-Girl Guide Week.

—Promoted Const. Robert Moreau of Milton Police to first class constable, effective Jan. 3.

—Received a note of thanks from Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Laking for flowers received on their 50th wedding anniversary.

—Approved an agreement with Eito and Jette Nijholt for an easement over lands at the

corner of Robert and Bell Sts. where a creek is to be partly enclosed.

—Decided to ask weed inspector Wilf Penson if he wants Goldenrod banned as a noxious weed under the Weed Control Act. Halton County Council tried unsuccessfully to have it banned across the county and now urban municipalities are being asked to ban it individually.

—Asked the clerk to pursue the possibility of using Milton Brick Co. lands for a garbage disposal site, noting no action had been taken on an earlier suggestion Milton, Esqueping and Nassagaweya use it together.

—Received notice hydro rates are going up 10 to 11 per cent in Milton, on all bills issued on and after March 1.

—Endorsed a bus service for industrial employees at Malton, to be operated by David Lewis of 95 Heslop Rd. Mayor Brian Best was authorized to attend a Highway Transport Board hearing and support the local man in his bid to obtain a licence.

—Received a note of thanks from 11 town works department employees for their Christmas bonus, a 1971 raise and an extra day's holiday in December.
