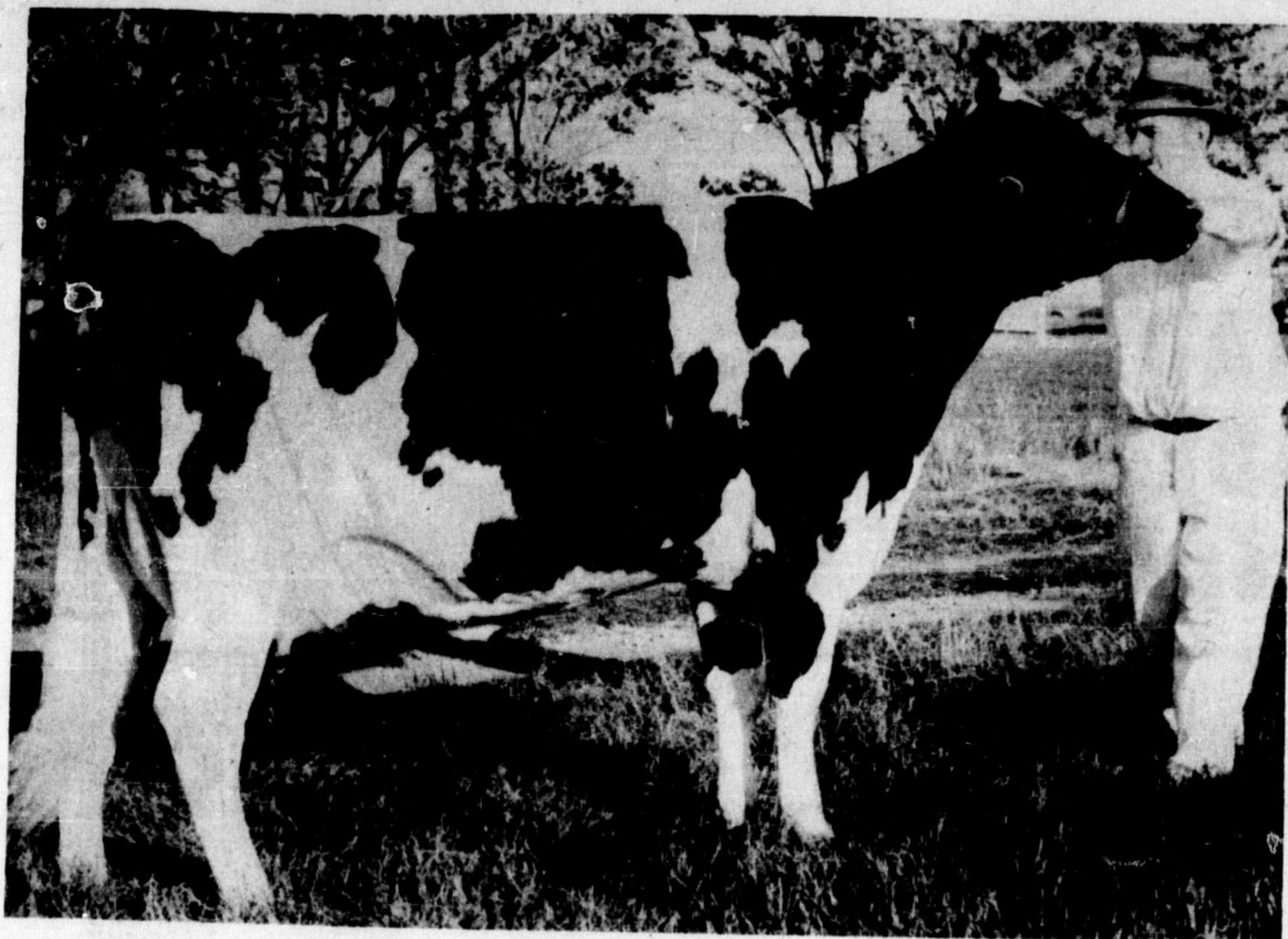

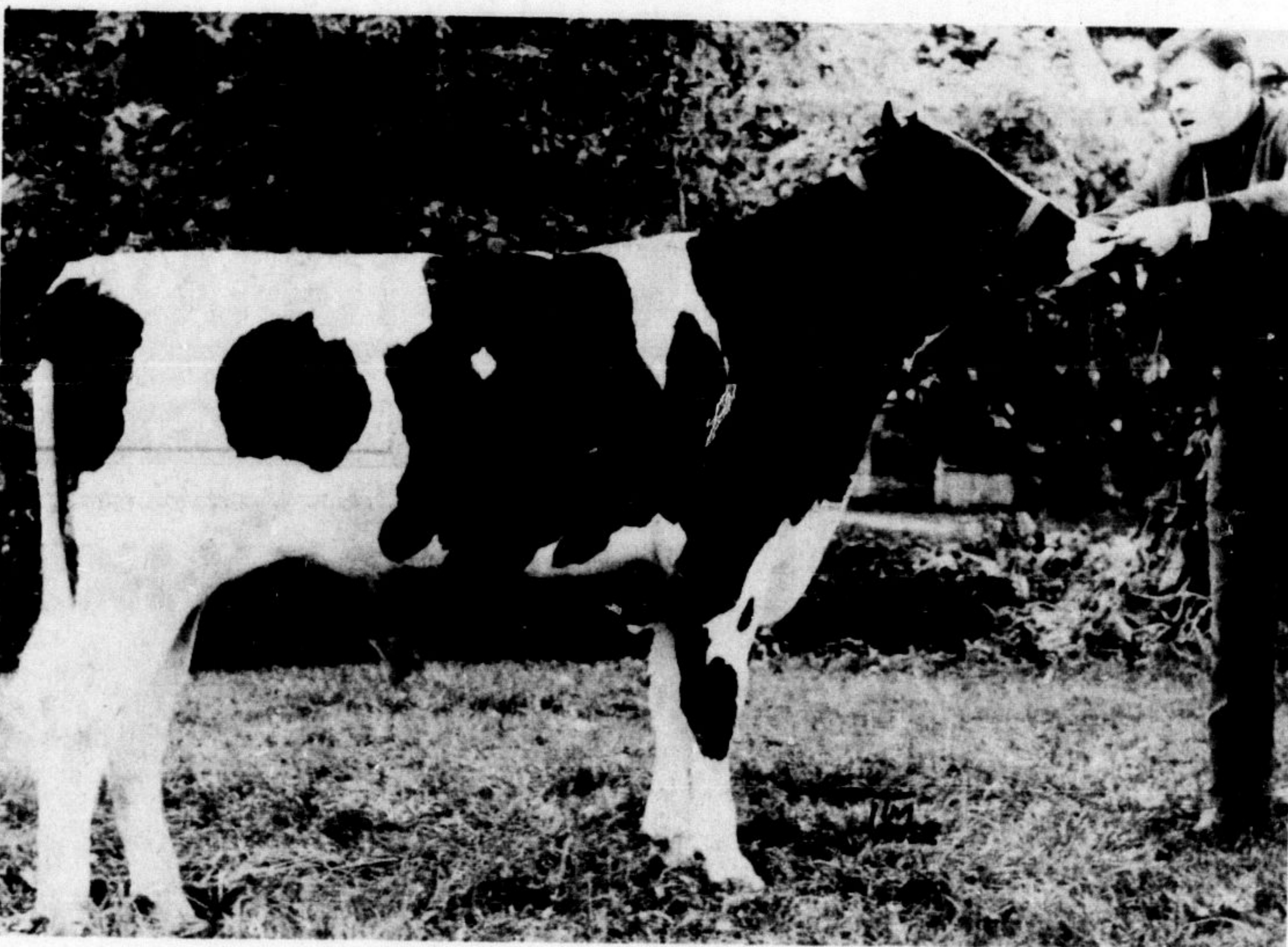
80 Holstein breeders attend annual meeting

Some 80 Holstein breeders and friends met in the North Oakville Community Centre on Thursday morning, Jan. 14 for their annual meeting. Guest speaker, Les Smith of Brooklin, discussed how it was possible to make a living with a small dairy herd. With just 24 cows milking he is able to finance his four sons in college and one son in high school. He stated that if you can't make a go on a small farm not to try going to a larger one. He rated the following as the most important on a dairy farm—the wife, who can make dairying enjoyable for all the family, the manager; and finally the Holstein cow.

Mr. Smith stated you should set goals that you can reach in the dairy business. If you get close to the goal then raise it. "You must go further than just having good cattle—you must grow good feed." He also cautioned farmers against investing too much in machinery. He suggested that the farmer should do the best he can with what he has and not always be looking to something different.

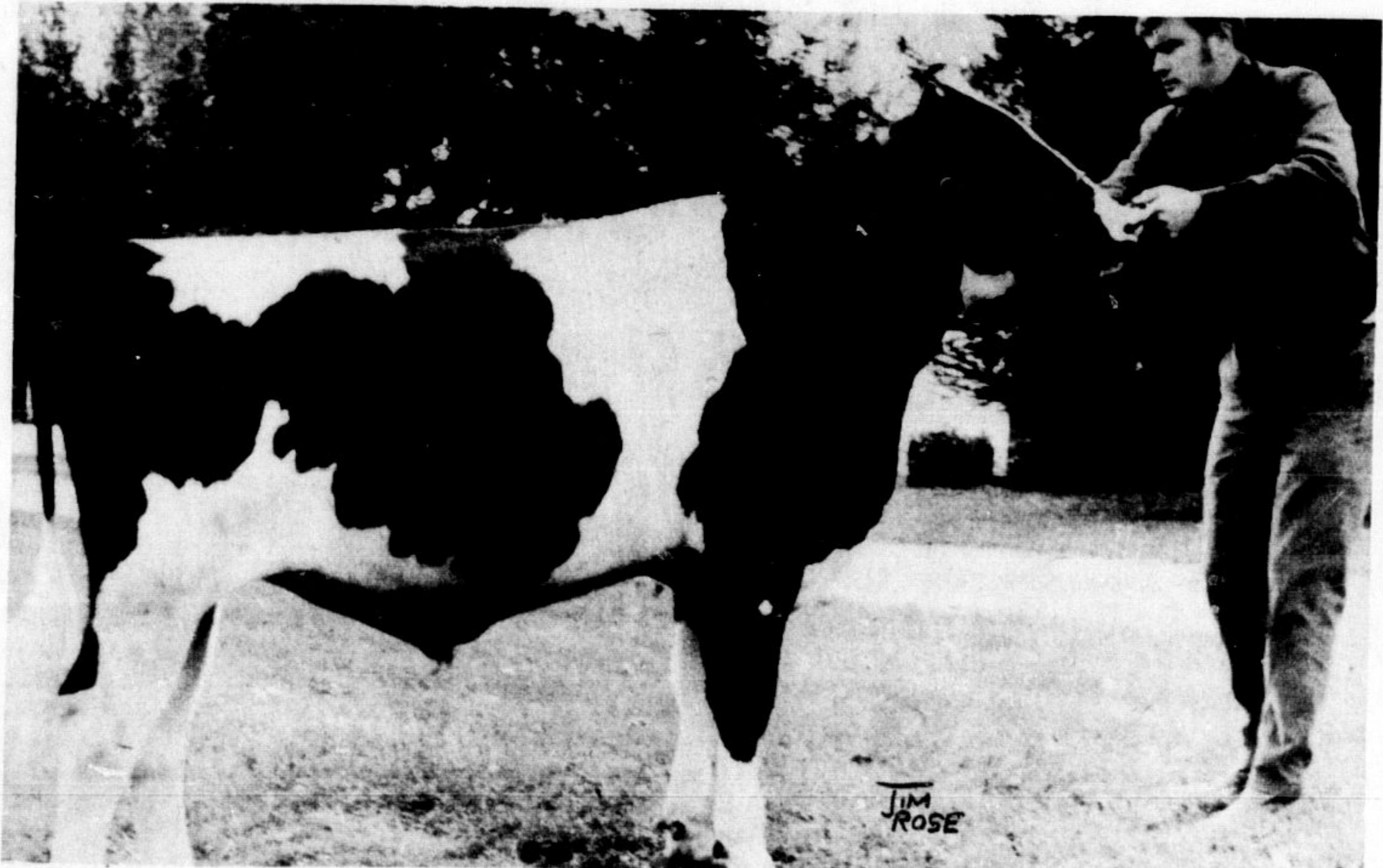
C. Inglis is president

being Reserve Grand Champion at Erin and first at the Royal Winter Fair; his Breeder's Herd was Reserve All-Canadian and his Get-of-Sire by Downlane Reflection Emperor, jointly owned by Wingrove and Douglas Gregson of Hillsburgh received honorable mention.

Both the All-Canadian and Reserve All-Canadian bull calves were bred by Howard Tarzwell of Georgetown, the All-Canadian being Surodana Marquis Model jointly owned by Terry Leslie,
