limit on his appointment one year ago. He said the manner in which the motion rescinding the motion appointing him was executed was done illegally. Mr. Gunby was member Waterdown Council and was defeated in the last election. He was replaced on the authority by Ken Bush. Gunby told reporters the council had offered no reason for taking him off the authority.

Follow council's wish Chairman Humphreys said the authority traditionally accepted the wish of the council in matters concerning representation and he noted they were left without an


