Spent in Burlington

Noting the rising cost of education she said, "no one is complaining loudly about this increase so much as they are about the Board's policy to spend our revenue in Burlington and close our Campbellville School." She challenged board suggestions the closing was an economic decision. "I can't help but wonder if it costs less to drive our students all the way to Brookville and then to Acton for their classes". She suggested riding on buses for hours every day and attending what would be an overcrowded school "gives little incentive to even the best students. I believe the scholastic satisfaction received at Campbellville should outweigh any economic reasons the board may have".

"Nassagaweya last" She asked the council to openly support "our objections to the school board policy of economics first, students last, south Halton first and Nassagaweya last."

Several members of council indicated they would like answers from the Board on their viewpoint. Councillor Art Gibson pointed

out Eden Mills students are now attending Acton and the kindergarten pupils from Campbellville are already attending Brookville.

He recalled the former Nassagaweya School Board had intended to build a new school in Campbellville and Eden Mills but the county board was introduced.

Should support "It behooves us, since the people of Campbellville are not happy, to support them", Reeve MacArthur suggested.

Members agreed to have the deputy reeve and Mrs. Smith meet the area school trustee Tom Watson to discuss the move.

Mrs. Smith noted she had hesitated to contact the trustee or board officials since they were "all pretty good talkers."

Chamber music orchestra is summer pilot project

A \$22,600 pilot project to be carried out this summer will give Milton a temporary resident 35-piece chamber music orchestra from July 3 to 23. "Kelso Music Centre" is a project of a group of citizens interested in promoting education and culture among young people and this summer's pilot project is for exceptionally talented music students. During July they will live at Ontario School for the Deaf in Milton and study chamber music under the tutelage of Canada's leading string ensemble, The Orford String Quartet.

Cost \$22,600
Students will be encouraged to attend the music centre through monies made available on a

scholarship basis and the enrolment is limited to 35. Overall cost of the month-long summer music centre is \$22,600. "Kelso Music Centre is a new concept in music training. We feel it is a worthwhile investment in the future of young musicians," said the executive. Among the executive members are Oakville Mayor F. A. Nixon to speak to Halton Liberals

The provincial nomination convention for the Halton East Liberal Association will be held at the Galaxy Club, North Service Road, Oakville, Tuesday March 2.

The location was picked this week after a convention committee inspected sites in Milton, Esquesing Township and Oakville.

Expect 500
"We expect more than 500 delegates to attend and the Galaxy Club lends itself to this large a crowd and this type of convention," said Ernie Zechman, convention chairman.

Ontario Liberal Leader Bob Nixon will be guest speaker at the nomination convention, Halton M.P. Rud L. Whiting will also speak.

Two persons—both from Oak-

ville—have thus far announced their intentions to seek the nomination: P. Robert Blake, of Westwood Drive; and David Butler, of Devon Road.

Zechman said the convention will start at 8 p.m., although doors will probably open at 7:30 p.m. to get registration and the issuing of ballots off to an early start.

Delegates must be members of the Halton and Halton East Liberal Association at least 72 hours before the meeting starts, he said.

He also indicated that the convention committee is planning to have bus service provided for delegates travelling to the convention from Acton, Erin, Georgetown, Esquesing and Milton.
