List Festival parade entries

A grand parade through Milton Saturday morning promises to be one of the highlights of this week's Snow Festival celebration, and might be one of the largest and most colorful parades ever seen in Milton.

John Perrott of Milton Optimist Club who is in charge of arranging the parade, reported a total of 21 floats are expected

along with two bands, majorettes, several cars carrying dignitaries and a number of other miscellaneous entries. It forms up at 9.30 at Milton Plaza and heads out at 10 o'clock to wind its way down Main St. through the downtown area. The parade turns at Brown St. and follows Hugh and King Sts. to Milton Fair Grounds where it concludes.

Changes mind

Wants apartment permit

Ben Crisci, owner of an apartment building on Martin St., has changed his mind and re-applied to Milton Council this week for a permit to change part of his building into eight bachelor apartment suites.

Last week Mr. Crisci has asked council to issue a permit for eight bachelor suites, although they did not all conform to the minimum floor area and room divider specifications of the zoning by-law. When council refused he lashed out at the council and told them he wasn't interested in going ahead with the project because the necessary changes would be too costly.

However he has since reconsidered, he explained in a letter read at Monday's meeting. He has agreed to abide by the provisions of the by-law by making all archways a minimum of six feet six inches wide so they cannot be enclosed to make two

separate rooms. He still sought relief from the minimum square footage ruling, though.

While some of the suites have as much as 510 square feet, two are 11 feet short of the minimum at 389 square feet. On the average the suites will work out to 435 square feet. Mayor Brian Best said it would be "ridiculous" to force the owner to move two walls (which have plumbing installed) a distance of nine inches to make up the 11 feet difference.

Councillors agreed to issue a permit if Mr. Crisci will obtain a minor variance through a Committee of Adjustment hearing.

Review council procedure rules

The mechanics of operation for Milton Council came under close scrutiny Tuesday of last week as members reviewed clause by clause the procedural by-law setting out the council rules of operation.

They covered 53 items of an 86 item by-law between 8 p.m. and 11.15 and set an objective to finish it in a subsequent meeting.

The by-law sets meetings for 7 p.m. and places a 10.30 curfew unless two thirds of the members agree to continue beyond that hour. Other clauses dealt with the voting procedure, the handling of amendments to motions, the

agenda for meetings, the declarations of conflict of interest and other detail.

May sit to talk

A clause restricting members to speaking only once on a subject was deleted and in a tie vote, broken by the mayor, members decided they shouldn't always have to stand to address council.

There was a desire to have most resolutions written but councillors wanted the freedom to submit verbal motions on routine matters and this was left to the clerk to phrase properly for inclusion in the by-law.

Fair board annual

Review fair's successes

Halton Agricultural Society held its annual meeting Saturday to discuss strong and weak points of the annual Milton Fall Fair, review reports of committees and elect directors for the coming year.

Re-elected president Alfred Ford noted the 4-H Silver Dollar competition was a first at Milton Fair and said it was fine addition to the fair. Musical ponies were another new attraction, the president noted.

Cut short

Members noted the horse races could have been even more successful had a downpour of rain not cut the event and the fair short. Mr. Ford said the pony races had interfered with the speech by the 4-H Queen and suggested the board consider starting the fair half an hour early next year to prevent this.

A report from the grounds committee complained about poor sheep pens and it was noted the hog event might be dropped from the program at the next fair. Cameron Marshall noted the grounds were better for the cattle this year than last.

Interest lost Jim McKay recommended consideration to closing the swine competition for the next fair as only two entries were received in that class.

Hugh Cook, speaking on behalf of the Junior Farmers said the dairy cattle show was really good but the safety event was poor. He complained about 4-Her's "getting pushed around," and requested consideration be given to allowing 4-H competitors to have one ring they could use for the day. He said the 4-H show was a poor one, partly because of the lack of provision.

The board made plans for the annual eucure party in April.

Attend conference

Jim McKay, Alfred Ford, Gerald Carton and Wilf Crozier were appointed to attend the Ontario provincial conference in Toronto.

The financial report shows expenditures during 1970 of \$29,529.40 and revenue of \$30,246.29 for a balance of \$716.89. Prize money paid out in 1970 totalled \$9,841 with the cattle

show claiming two-thirds of that amount. During the year the board spent \$2,729 on improvements to grounds and buildings.

Mrs. George Readhead tendered her resignation last year at the annual meeting but said she would carry on until she is replaced. She is still carrying on but told the board she still wished to be replaced if a replacement can be found.
