Obituary

Christian Frank

Christian (Chris) Frank of R.R. 2 Rockwood, died suddenly at Milton District Hospital on Jan. 12. He was in his 65th year. Mr. Frank was born to Joseph and Edith Frank on April 21, 1906 in Nassagaweya Township. He attended school at S.S. No. 7 Nassagaweya and helped his parents with the farm and wood business until he went west to Saskatchewan in 1928.

Out west he worked in a garage and learned a mechanic's trade until he returned to Nassagaweya in 1931. On April 5, 1941 he married Mary Charlotte Wilson in Eden Mills and took up residence at R.R. 2 Rockwood. He worked in Georgetown and Milton and farmed in his spare time.

In August 1966 he was employed by the Cockshutt Company and later the same

year by Dixie Equipment Co. where he worked until the time of his death.

In May, 1967 he moved from the farm to Fifteen Sideroad.

Humorist, friend

Mr. Frank had been ill for a long time and is sadly missed by his neighbors who found him quite a humorist and good friend. He was active in sports all his life and fond of antique motor shows.

Surviving are his wife Mary, brothers William of Nassagaweya, Bob and Tony of Acton, Joseph of Georgetown, Karl of Port Credit and James of Glen Williams; sisters Minnie (Mrs. Bud James) of Georgetown, Laura (Mrs. Gordon Silcock) of Burwash and Wilfred, deceased.

Funeral service was held at McKersie Funeral Home in Milton on Jan. 15 with Rev. D. Nicholson officiating. Interment was in Nassagaweya Presbyterian Cemetery. Presbyterians were neighbors George Dredge, Ted Jennings, Moe Thibodeau and Charles Baynton; nephew Wayne Howden of Milton and friend Howard Timmins of Hamilton.

Four instalments Esquising taxes

Esquising township taxes may be paid in four instalments this year. Due dates for payments are May 15, July 15, September 15 and November 15.

Taxes not paid by the due dates will be subject to a penalty of 1 per cent on the first day of default

and 1 per cent on the first day of each month they are not paid. A penalty not to exceed 1 per cent per month will be applied to tax arrears.

Payment of taxes in four instalments is being introduced in the township for the first time. Taxes were previously paid in one instalment with a percentage discount allowed for taxes paid before September 1.

Liberal candidate wants Department of Environment

A Liberal government in Ontario will establish a Department of the Environment to provide a "focus" for the fight against pollution, P.R. (Bob) Blake, said today.

Mr. Blake, an Oakville resident, is seeking the provincial nomination for Halton.

Such a department, he said would be the nerve centre of the government in its struggle to preserve the quality of the environment.

Stresses wise use

"It will be the responsibility of this Department to ensure that henceforth government decisions will be based on ecological criteria, rather than purely economic considerations. This priority will extend not only to the expenditure of monies but to the other resources of government as well. This policy is based on the belief that our long-term economic well-being is dependent on the wise use of our water, air, soil, and other natural resources."

Mr. Blake added that the new department's minister would also establish an Environmental Council "to assess in an objective way, the progress of our government's anti-pollution and environmental programs."

"Its objectives will be analogous to that of the Economic Council of Canada in economic affairs. It will in no way serve as a defender of
