Game & Fish News

At one of the most recent meetings of the Halton Sportsmen's Association I had a chance to talk to one of the most popular outdoor writers of a large newspaper. As talk progressed the age-old question came up, "How does a hunter justify his going out and shooting a duck or deer when we live in a world of plenty?"

The writer looked at me and said "Arnold, it is nearly time that the hunter didn't have to justify what he does," but a good answer is that you preserve by the same methods used by many members of our club and our neighbors on whose land we hunt. At the hunter's expense most times he regularly restocks and plants cover in the country in which we shoot.

More Productive

As a result private hunting lands are now much more productive in wildlife than they were when the organization took over the land. Bruce West, another newspaper columnist puts it this way, "Many former hunters stopped hunting and I imagine they have their own reasons for doing so. Also I think it is quite apparent that for some years now far more things have been done in a practical way to promote wildlife conservation by hunters and former hunters than any other organization."

If you doubt this statement I refer you to Ducks Unlimited, made up mainly of hunters and former hunters who have saved and made breeding and nesting grounds for millions of ducks. You can in no way relate these sportsmen with the morons who go about our country shooting at anything and everything that moves.

Supports wildlife

Through the fishermen's licence fees and such activities as those of the Canadian National Sportsmen's show which alone has raised and distributed over two and a half million dollars to various wildlife projects, they contribute large sums to conservation each year. I think it is only fair that we who call ourselves sportsmen and go hunting and fishing should not all be tarred by the same brush.

Again we have bad news for snowmobilers. Large tracts of land in our north are going to be banned to these machines except for trappers, Indians or emergency cases. Wilful nuisance is having a serious effect on moose and deer. This increased the incidence of broken bones, exhausted and disorganized herds of moose and deer, especially moose. It is affecting the number of young born each year, thus reducing the moose herds. Regulations are necessary.

Ice fishing is not too good at Simcoe. A recent trip by members of the Halton Sportsmen's Association resulted in a couple of smelts and a few herring. Lake Nipissing, a favorite spot in the past few years for many local ice fishermen, is not safe. Two snowmobilers went through the ice at Bear Creek near Callendar last week. If you go ice fishing, take a guide. He'll know where it is safe.
