## Assessment close to "60 - 40" ratio

commercial to residential assessment in Milton is getting closer to the "ideal" 60-40 ratio, but it hasn't reached the magic figure just yet.

Figures from the town office indicate industrial and commercial assessment stand at \$5,000,869 or 37.13 per cent of the town's total of \$13,467,774. A year ago it was 36.7 per cent so it has climbed .43 per cent in the past

Some suggested the town should cover in the creek. Several complained of sewer backups in the past and expressed the fear that further strain on the district's sewage facilities would produce further problems.

Planning Board chairman Norm Pearce felt it was the town's responsibility to improve stream when the development goes ahead. He hoped it would be properly sodded, banked and rip-rapped where necessary.

Board members noted the pump at the Robert St. pumping station had been enlarged last December and there had been no sewer backups since. Its capacity was reportedly doubled.

Deputy Reeve Percy Barr felt that if the creek had a smell it could be partly blamed on area residents who throw trash into the stream. "It is probably the fault of some of the residents on that street," he said.

The board finally approved the Civiero rezoning and expressed the hope the stream would be improved and cleaned up to the satisfaction of the Bell St.



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
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
