Did you know that around 1900 you could get a five year licence for 50 cents and each year you could shoot five deer or a total of 25 for 50 cents? That is a real bargain compared to today's fees.

Rainbows seeking the headwaters of the Boyne or Nottawassaga Rivers will be able to pass through these two fish ladders. Most trout using the fish ladders are tagged, measured, examined for lamprey marks. The first fish was caught and tagged last year on April 11.
