Councillors give selves good raise

Halton County councillors voted themselves and Warden F.G. Oakes raises at Halton County Council's March meeting held yesterday (Tuesday) in Milton.

The warden's salary will be raised to \$10,000 from \$6,500 and councillors will receive a salary of \$3,000 a year. Councillors have previously been paid \$30 a meeting. Last year's salaries for councillors ranged from \$900 to \$3,300 for the year. Councillors will still receive \$30 per diem for attending conventions on top of other convention expenses.

Won't dock absentees
An amendment to have councillors docked \$30 for each meeting they missed, with a grace of three meetings was defeated. At the same meeting council defeated a recommendation from the finance committee urging a \$1,000 cut in costs the Warden's dinner, bringing it from \$1,500 to \$500.

Georgetown reeve Rick Morrow said he had gone along with the salary idea but felt members not attending shouldn't be paid and he did not want to be accused of taking advantage of the system. He explained he had to be absent at times because of work and felt he and others in that position should not be paid.

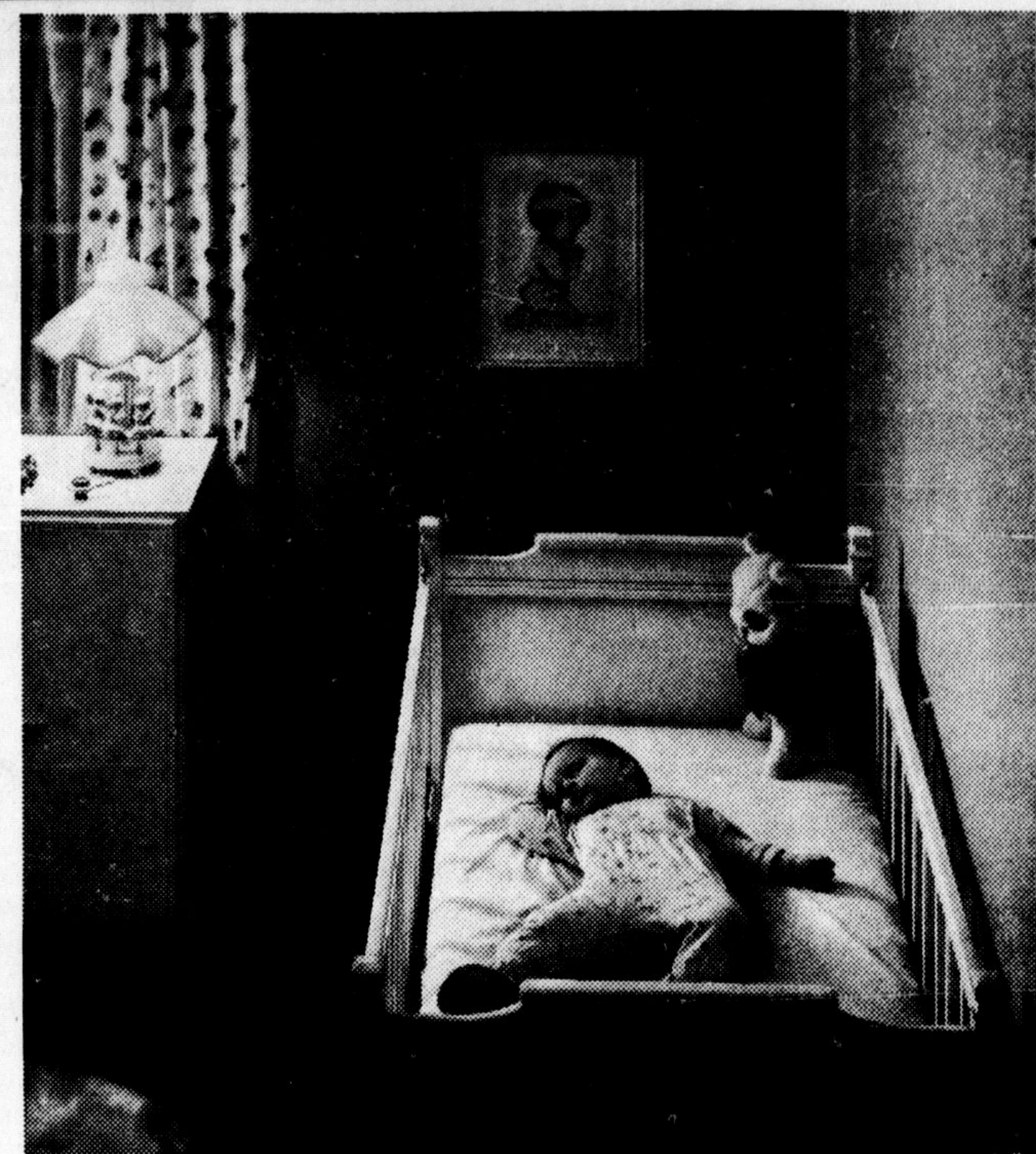
Ebenezer Birthday cake U.C.W. meet

Accept gas tender

Esquing Council accepted the tender of Texaco Ltd. to install gas pumps and supply fuel for the township's new works garage. Acceptance of the tender followed a recommendation by roads superintendent C. E. "Bud" Snover. Texaco will supply gasoline at a price of 23.9 cents per gallon and diesel fuel at a price of 20.6 cents per gallon.

May have won battle over Halton weedspray

Conservationists may have won a fight to have certain potentially dangerous roadside weed sprays eliminated from county use. A letter from Jim Etherington representing Oakville Rod and Gun Club and Halton Environmental Protective Association sparked a controversy recently. In his letter Mr. Etherington brought to council's attention a warning on the labels of the chemical containers. The warning notes that chemicals 2, 4, D and 2, 4, 5 T could cause danger to pregnant women and their offspring. The warning advises the chemical shouldn't be used along creek banks or on swamp land or any area that might lead to a water supply. Mr. Etherington approached county council Tuesday and reviewed his stand on the matter. He said if the warning was false and there was absolutely no danger, he would understand the county using the spray.

used in a ratio of no more than one half part per million it would not be harmful. He noted manufacturers were well within this limit and the spray was diluted in water many times before it was used.

Mercury wasn't either
Etherington said he was concerned about human safety. He recalled a time 20 years ago when it was believed mercury wasn't dangerous.

Council agreed to let tenders for brush and weed kill without specifying types or brands. Roads chairman Reeve Jim Swanborough said he had written letters to various governmental bodies and was collecting information on the matter. He said the spray may yet be used, but would be subject

to further consideration. The spray is used in Viet Nam as defoliant war spray and according to Stephenson it has been abused in that country.
