The warden's salary will be raised to \$10,000 from \$6,500 and councillors will receive a salary of \$3,000 a year. Councillors have previously been paid \$30 a meeting. Last year's salaries for councillors ranged from \$900 to \$3,300 for the year. Councillors will still receive \$30 per diem for attending conventions on top of other convention expenses.

### May have won battle over Halton weedspray to further consideration. Conservationists may have used in a ratio of no more than The spray is used in Viet Nam

won a fight to have certain potentially dangerous roadside weed sprays eliminated from county use. A letter from Jim Etherington representing Oakville Rod and Gun Club and Halton Environmental Protective Association sparked a controversy recently.

In his letter Mr. Etherington brought to council's attention a warning on the labels of the chemical containers. The warning notes that chemicals 2, 4, D and 2, 4, 5 T could cause danger to pregnant women and their offspring. The warning advises the chemical shouldn't be used along creek banks or on swamp land or any area that might lead to a water supply.

Mr. Etherington approached county council Tuesday and reviewed his stand on the matter. He said if the warning was false and there was absolutely no danger, he would understand the county using the spray.

No Harm

Dr. Gerry Stephenson, a professor at the University of Guelph and a specialist in botany told council no harm would come to pregnant or ther people as a result of the chemical if it were used cautiously. He pointed out tests showing damage to rats and mice were conducted with chemicals contaminated with Dioxin.

As long as the contaminate was

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one half part per million it would not be harmful. He noted manufacturers were wel within this limit and the spray was diluted in water many times before it was used.

Mercury wasn't either Etherington said he was concerned about human safety. He recalled a time 20 years ago when it was believed mercury wasn't dangerous.

Council agreed to let tenders for brush and weed kill without specifying types or brands. Roads chairman Reeve Jim Swan borough said he had written letters to various governmental bodies and was collecting information on the matter. He said the spray may yet be used, but would be subject
