Mr. Vandebloom and helper Joe Vandevalk ably demonstrated milking on their fine herd of 34 cows, beginning with the sterilizing of the milk pipe line and milkers. The milk was carried to the dumping station and then into the large refrigerated tank which holds nearly two ton of milk or 400 gallons. The girls were quite interested in the great care and work which was required to produce group one pool grade A milk. Every girl had her picture posed with a cow, these will go in the record books. The 4-H project this spring is featuring dairy products, so it was a fine idea to go at milking time.

All thanked Mr. Vandebloom for his kindness and patience in explaining the cooling process and how the large tank truck comes every other day and sucks out the last drop and whisks it away for further processing and distribution to stores and customers.
