The milk was carried to the dumping station into the large refrigerated tank which holds nearly two ton of milk or 400 gallons. The girls were quite interested in the great care and work which was required to produce group one pool grade A milk. Every girl had her picture posed with a cow, these will go in the record books. The 4-H project this spring is featuring dairy products, so it was a fine idea to go at milking time.


