

High school athletes shatter 27 old records

Milton District High School athletes who set field day records at the school last year had little chance of keeping their names in the book after this year's crew of athletes held their record-shattering field day Thursday.

A total of 27 records were broken and in the girls' division four were tied as well. Of the 27 new records, 13 were in the girls' division and 14 in the boys.

Tony Pedulla ran the 200 metre race in 25.5 seconds to set a record in the midget division, Robert Langridge ran the 800 metre at 2:29.8, while Ken Lauppee had his name etched into the record book with a 31 foot 10 inch triple jump record.

More records

Still in the midget boys, Scott McKenzie topped competition in the javelin throwing with a recorded 74 foot three inch performance and a team including Robert Langridge, Graham Bradshaw, Mike Orpen and Wayne Roskam completed the 1,500 metre relay race in 4:51 minutes to cop the record in the midget category.

Fleet footed Randy Simpson, who is probably better known for his performance in the Junior Merchant goal, ran the 200 metre

race in 24.7 seconds to shatter the previous junior record.

Broke two

John Arnold broke two records with a 37 foot two inch performance with the shot putt and a 134 foot five inch toss of the javelin. The only other record breaking junior was Dave Roberts with an eight foot, three inch effort in the pole vaulting.

In the senior classification five new names were inserted into the record book. Bob Martin set a new record in the running broad jump at 18 feet four inches and then came back with a 38 foot two inch effort to win the triple jump.

Roberts is hot

Pete Roberts came through with three records in three of the toughest classifications, a 39 foot nine inch record in the shot putt, a 114 foot performance at the discus and he heaved the javelin for 121 feet five inches for his third record.

A 14.7 second run in the 100 metre race by Debbie Roberts and Nancy Nova saw the record tied while Jane Bird ran the 200 metre event in 30.4 seconds in the midget girls' action.

Debbie Roberts completed the 80 metre hurdle competition in record breaking time and tied the record for the running broad jump with a 13 foot four inch leap.

Still in midget girls Ivy Anne Stull jumped four feet four inches to tie the high jump record and Trudy Sales registered a 27 foot two inch record performance in the shot putt.

A team of Paxton, Van Sickle, McDonald and Bird set a new record in the girls' relay with a 60.0 second effort. Nancy Nova's 1.13 minute effort in the 400 metre race broke the record while

Natalie Dudnick set a record in the 800 metre event at 4:16.9.

Good work

Brenda Schultz tied a record with a 14.8 second 100 metre run in the junior events, broke the 200 metre record with a 27.3 second run and paced a team of Schultz, Coulson, Wilson and Robinson to a 60.02 relay record.

Kathy Rusk hopped the 80 metre hurdles in record breaking time of 16 seconds while Gillian

Lorner set another record with a four foot six inch jump in the junior girls' high jumping competition.

Three old records went by the board in the senior girls' efforts when Igrid Van Lingen ran the 200 metre race in 32.9 seconds, Ruth Reed hurdled the 80 metre event in 15.7 seconds and the Mullin, Reed, Provaznik and Dudnik team broke the senior girls' effort in the relay race.

Campbellville club in action host Waterdown on Sunday

Campbellville will open their Halton Senior League season this Sunday, May 16, in Campbellville with Waterdown supplying the opposition. Last year's second place finishers are almost intact as the only players missing from September's squad are Ron Naylor, Robert Lee, and Jack Roberts.

Incidentally all are pitchers. Naylor, a southpaw strike-out specialist injured his ankle during the winter and it is hoped

will return soon. Lee, another southpaw who contributed several key efforts late in the season last year, is away at school in the U.S.A. but is expected back in mid-June. Roberts, the third left hander, has retired after a wonderful career. He was the backbone of the Campbellville mound staff for 16 years.

20 year men

Ken Moore and Harry Hamilton are the real veterans of the club. They are both starting their 20th season in the league—19 of them with Campbellville. Moore has been hitting with authority all spring and will probably win a starting spot in spite of keen competition and Hamilton is expected to take his regular turn on the mound. Both are former All Stars on several occasions, and Moore has won the League's Most Valuable Player award.

Elmer Dredge and Bill Elliot will be starting their 17th season in the league—16 with Campbellville. Both are also former All-Stars and Dredge has won the MVP award.

Once again Dredge will anchor the infield from his familiar shortstop position and Elliot will add left-handed pinch hitting strength to the team.

George Chester and Larry McPhail are starting their 12th and 11th seasons with Campbellville respectively and they round out the veteran contingent of the squad. Chester will be battling for the left-field job and McPhail will probably share first base with Pete Andrews.

Improve batting

Doug Lang will be starting his third season as Campbellville's catcher and is expected to improve on last year's 248 batting average. He hit 286 in 1969. The catching duties will be shared by Pete Andrews who will be playing in his sixth season and led the team in hitting last year with a 346 average. Pete will also appear at first base and possibly in the outfield.

Bill Dennis and Garnet Mitchell will be playing in their fifth season with Campbellville. Dennis is particularly valuable because of his versatility. He is a regular outfielder, a good substitute infielder and is fighting for a regular spot on the pitching staff. Mitchell who won six and lost two on the hill last year and came up with an excellent 1.40 earned run average will undoubtedly be one of the big guns of the hurling corps.

Left handed hitters

Bruce Evans and Al Jordan will be in their third season with Campbellville. Both are left-handed hitting outfielders and both have been impressive this spring especially in last Sunday's inter-squad game.

The three sophomores from Milton are back and are all expected to improve on their outstanding freshman seasons. Richard Clement who hit .338 in 1970 and led the team in most

offensive statistics is a brilliant outfielder who will be starting the season in either centre or right field. Don Hearn and Loris Faggion, both excellent fielders, will be back at third and second respectively. With a year of senior ball under their belts both will improve both offensively and defensively although their 1970 defensive efforts left little to be desired. Tom Ramshaw who was with the team in 1967, played in Milton in 1968, and in Northern Ontario in 1970 is also back.

Campbellville is also looking at half a dozen first year men. Most prominent of these is Peter Roberts who starred for Milton Midgets last year.

This big, strong, 18-year-old has been most impressive all spring and manager Earl Cairns expects him to take up the slack left by Naylor, Lee, and Jack Roberts and win a regular starting job.

Other first year men who have been showing well under the close scrutiny of manager Cairn are Rick Mitchell, Steve Smith, Tom Stokes, Ray Tonelli and John White.

Inter-squad game

Sunday's inter-squad game ended in a 4-4 tie. In five innings Pete Roberts gave up two runs (only one earned) off six hits. He walked two and struck-out three. In four innings Garnet Mitchell allowed one run off two hits. He walked two and struck-out one. Harry Hamilton also went four

innings allowing two runs off three hits while walking three and striking-out two.

Bill Dennis gave up one run in three innings. He walked one and allowed two hits. Jim Rankin, Campbellville's batting practise pitcher also worked two innings, giving up two runs off three hits. He walked two and struck-out one.

Mitchell leads

Rick Mitchell led the hitters in the inter-squad game with a double and a single. Elmer Dredge and George Chester each singled twice. Al Jordan and Tom Ramshaw doubled and Ray Tonelli, Pete Roberts, Doug Lang, Don Hearn, Bruce Evans, John White, Loris Faggion and Harry Hamilton all singled.

Play Sunday

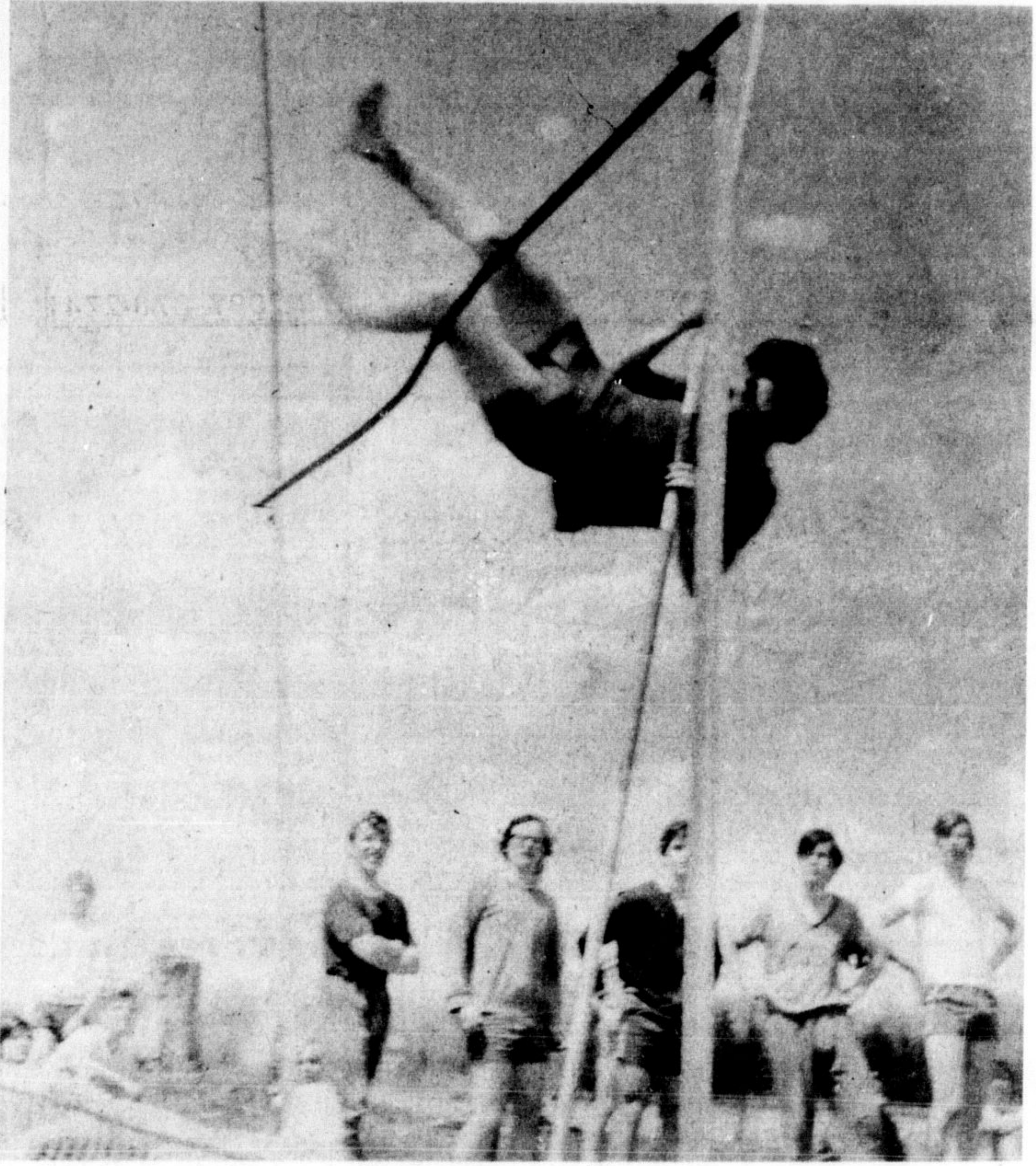
