Leaders, members honored at 4-H achievement day

4-H Homemaking Club members met Saturday at the Stewarttown Public School for the Achievement Day for their spring project, "Dairy Fare". There were 86 completions in the eight clubs which made up the north Halton group. Also attending were the 16 club leaders and about 40 visitors.

The morning program consisted of menu judging, a quiz on the project and identification of dairy foods. During the afternoon each club presented a skit or set up an exhibit on topics ranging from "Three Ways with Cheese", and "Dairy Desserts", to "What Milk Did for Miranda".

Visitors Mrs. Mansell Nellis, 1st vice-president, Halton District Women's Institute brought greetings from the organizations which sponsor many of the clubs. Visiting Home Economists were Miss Carroll Yakalashak and Mrs. Kathy Williams of Toronto.

County honors, for the completion of six 4-H Homemaking Club units, were presented to Sharon Ellerby and Janice Swackhamer of Bannockburn, Bonnie Kirkwood of Ballinafad, and Cathy Lindsay, Limehouse.

Recipients of provincial honors certificates and pins were Marilyn Barber, Doris Black and Cathy Lasby of Dublin, Heather Hyatt of Norval, and Mary McGee of Ashgrove. These members have completed 12 units.

Advanced honors Mrs. Eileen Brown of Ballinafad received advanced honors and a silver pie server for completing 18 different 4-H Homemaking club projects. Mrs. Doreen Bannister, Halton

and Peel County Home Economist, presented a leadership award to Mrs. J. F. McCarron on behalf of the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs. Mrs. McCarron has been a leader

of the Dublin club for five years.

Teachers reject 7% board offer

Halton County Secondary school teachers rejected the Halton County Board of Education's final offer after a series of meetings to deal with salary negotiations. The package offer is valued at seven per cent more than last year's settlement, according to the board release. The board's offer was rejected by a vote of 93.6 per cent which represents 74 per cent of the teacher population at a meeting of the teachers Thursday.

The offer includes an increment that would cause an increase of three per cent, adjustments to the salary schedule causing an increase of 3.6 per cent and fringe benefits of .4 per cent. The offer includes increased O.H.S., O.H.S.I.P., extended health and group insurance plans.

Current schedule Under the current schedule teacher salaries range from a low of \$7,100 to a high of \$15,100 with extra allowances for department heads.

Under the current schedule vice principals receive from \$17,000 to \$19,500 and principals receive from \$20,000 to \$23,000.

Co-ordinators now receive from \$17,500 to \$19,500 while

assistant co-ordinators receive from \$16,000 to \$17,500 and consultants are paid according to their rating on the salary schedule for teachers plus \$2,000.

Responsible offer The Board release said the Board felt their offer was a fair and responsible one in the light of existing economic conditions and teacher supply.

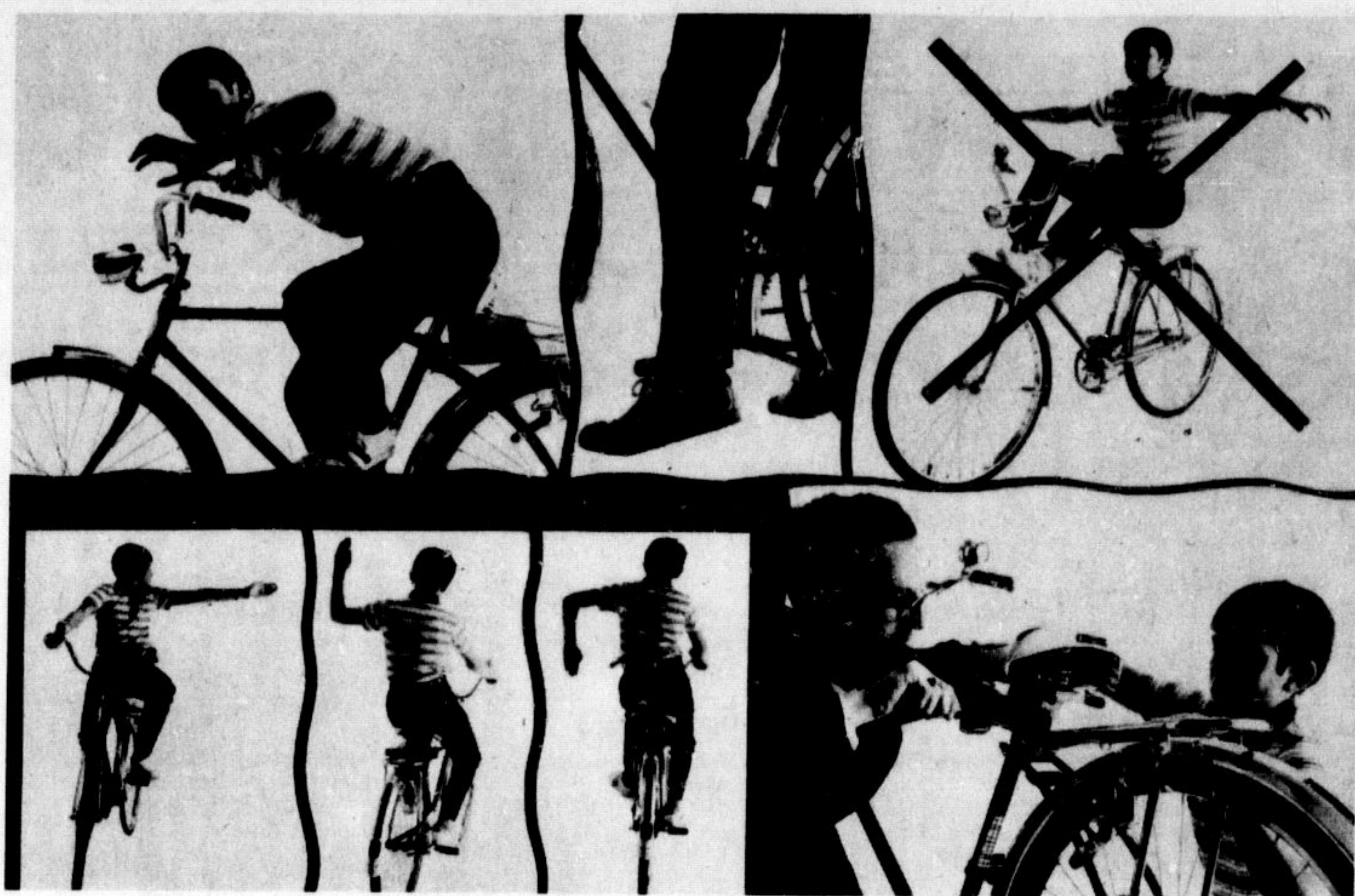
Paul Martindale, a president of Zone Nine District of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, said there were four reasons why he thought the offer was turned down.

He said Peel County teachers received \$500 more than Halton teachers and the Peel teachers carry a lighter load. He said the teachers were upset because the board offer allowed greater increases at the lower level than at the higher level where the most experienced and most qualified people are.

Martindale said the offer was actually only worth three per cent because the increment was an automatic thing. He noted that only three per cent was influenced by collective bargaining.

Deaf ears He said the teachers' request for better working condition have fallen on deaf ears. "We don't seem to have made much progress in this line," he said.

Additional audio visual equipment and a greater number of secretaries were the two areas he pointed out in relation to working conditions. Martindale said the two points were priority items.



BICYCLE ACCIDENTS can be prevented!

Here are some tips from the Ontario Department of Transport. Make sure the bike fits the child. A youngster on a bike too big for him is five times as likely to be involved in a collision as one on a bike of the proper size. The ball of his foot should reach the ground comfortably from a seated position. Make sure your child knows and obeys the rules of the road. Cyclists must obey traffic signs and must signal their turns, stops and lane changes. . . no stunting or showing off in traffic. Make sure your child's bike is in safe mechanical condition. Nuts should be tightened, moving parts lubricated. For after-dark driving, the bike must have a front light and a red reflector or light on the rear; plus reflective tape. . . red on the rear fender, white on the front forks.

Grass, car blazes

Car and grass fires are keeping Milton Fire Department busy these early spring days. Thursday was called to extinguish two grass fires and two car fires this past week.

While driving along Hwy. 401 east of Campbellville Eric Deklerick of Norwich was alerted by a passing motorist that his automobile was on fire. Pulling to the shoulder Mr. Deklerick and a passenger escaped the burning auto seconds before it became engulfed in flames.

Milton Fire Department was called to extinguish the blaze. Damage to the car is estimated at \$3,000.

Firefighters also put out a car fire on Ninth Line, Oakville Friday. A 1969 Datsun owned by Mrs. Alex Finnie was ablaze. The car was badly damaged but cause of the fire is unknown.

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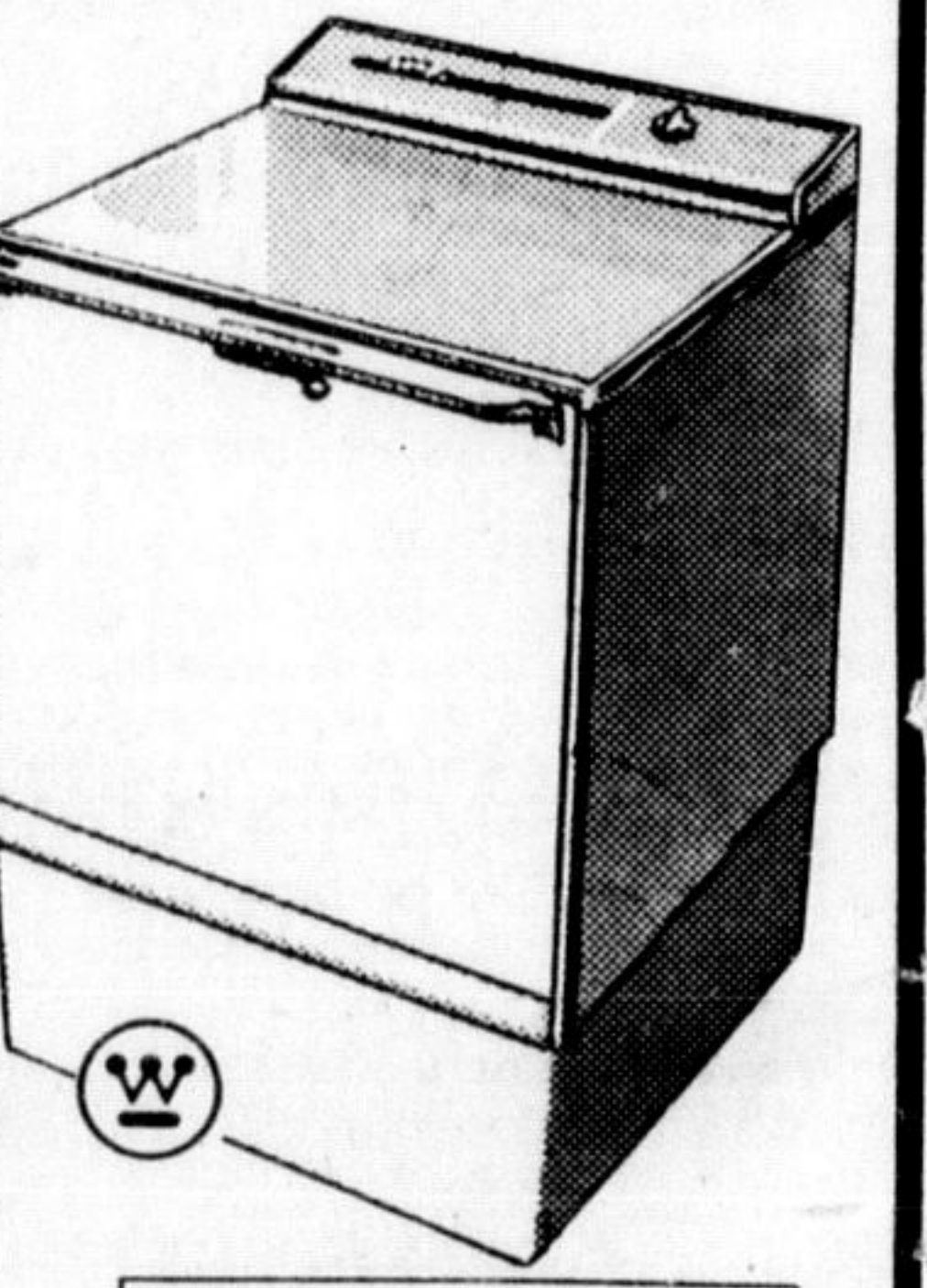
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
