lamprey are. When this is done feeder stations are set up. From the feeder stations lampricide is pumped into the water giving the water a yellow, green color.

While the lampricide is being fed into the streams a number of persons are busy doing their job. One man, a sample runner, does nothing but bring samples of the water from the creek at various locations.

A biologist analyzes the samples and the information learned is recorded on a series of complex graphs. The concentration of TFM in the water must remain constant and this is the purpose of the graphs and samples.

Add boosters
If the tests show the concentration is too low down stream, boosters are added and the chemical concentration is reinforced. The concentration necessary is a varying factor.

This factor is determined at a small lab set up in a trailer at the camp headquarters. Here a team of men has samples of the creek water with varying levels of chemical concentration.

In each container there are young lamprey and in other containers of the same chemical


concentration are small trout or suckers of whatever is found in the actual creek.

The object of the test is to find out how much of the TFM is too much for the fish and how much is enough to kill the lamprey. Once this is determined a factor somewhere in between the two levels is derived.

Varies with conditions
The concentration of the chemical varies from creek to creek depending on the hardness of the water, the depth, speed of water flow, amount of calcium and temperature. The treatment has to be done while the water is still cool to prevent killing fish. Officials note the chemical is not toxic to farm stock, wild animals or humans.

Bill Davis, head biologist on the project, explained the importance of having the treatment completed before the warm weather came. "If we had to treat it in the heat of the summer we'd kill every fish in the river."

TFM has been better than 80 per cent effective in other locations. While it appears impossible to ever eliminate lamprey, if commercial or sport fishing is to continue the predator will have to be controlled.



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
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
