Hamilton puts fire out C'ville wins opener

Veteran Harry Hamilton, starting his twentieth year of Halton County Senior competition came in in relief of rookie Peter Roberts in the fourth inning last Sunday and chalked up his first victory of the 1971 campaign. Hamilton allowed but one run in five and one third inning as his team came on to win by a 10-8 score.

He walked five and struck-out six. Pete Roberts, making his first appearance above the midget level showed great promise. He allowed seven runs in three and two-thirds innings as he struck-out five, walked one and hit a batter while giving up 10 hits. Over the first three innings he held Waterdown to one run.

Went six Al Boynton started for Waterdown and was relieved by Neil Dodman in the sixth. Between them they allowed 10 runs off 10 hits while striking-out seven, walking eight and hitting one batter.

Waterdown took a 1-0 lead in the first. With two out and a man on first, singles by Lockington and Scanlon produced the tally. Campbellville came back in their half to take a three to one lead. Lang and Andrews walked, Dredge singled in one run, another scored on an infield out and the third on Ray Tonelli's single.

McPhail homers In the bottom of the third Campbellville scored three again to make it 6-1. Lary McPhail opened the inning with a home-

run. Loris Faggion got to second on a two-base error by the Waterdown centre fielder and scored on a two base error by the Waterdown third baseman. He took third after Don Hearn's fly was caught in centre-field and scored on Doug Lang's single.

Waterdown's big inning was the fourth when they scored six runs to take a 7-6 lead and drive Roberts from the mound. Phillips and Stan Bailey singled and both scored on Borowski's double.

Roberts then came up with two strike-outs but then hit a batter. Mike Bailey's double drove in two more and then Alex Lockington hit a tremendous home-run over the centre field fence to score two more and Hamilton came in to put out the fire. In the sixth Waterdown scored again to take a 8-6 lead. Mike Bailey singled to open the inning and then three walks forced in the run.

Come alive In the bottom of the sixth Campbellville came to life again as they scored four times to take a 10-8 lead and drove Boynton to the showers. Pete Andrews opened the inning with a walk and went to third and Elmer Dredge's double. George Chester's single drove in both runners and McPhail's walk pushed Chester on to second from where he scored the fourth run of the inning on Faggion's double.

Mike Bailey with a double and two singles led the Waterdown attack.

Waterdown hitters Wilson hit three singles, Lockington homered and singled, King and Borowski doubled and Scanlon, Phillips and Stan Bailey all singled. For Campbellville Elmer Dredge doubled and singled, Doug Lang singled twice, Lary McPhail homered, Loris Faggion doubled and Peter Andrews, George Chester, Ray Tonelli and Don Hearn's all singled.


