

# Table tennis champion tells girls about trip

Scaling the Great Wall of China and playing several friendly matches of table tennis against the Communist Chinese were terms "a dream become reality" by Canada's top woman table tennis player, 20-year-old Violetta Nesukaitis of Toronto. She related her "most exciting experience" to more than 100 girls at the first annual banquet of the Girls' Athletic Association of Milton District High School, held at St. Paul's United Church, Monday evening.

Violetta, who has won more than 50 championships in her nine year competitive career, recently returned with the rest of the Canadian team from a five week tour of China, Japan and several interesting cities and competed in the Commonwealth Games in Singapore.

**Practice makes perfect**  
"It is very important for a player of any sport to get into the hard fought, fast games to improve her playing and style," Violetta agreed with her father, J. Nesukaitis, who was also a guest at the dinner. "And practice makes perfect in any sport."  
The young athlete related her trip to the audience of girls and recalled step by step the interesting and exciting places of interest and moments of tension in the Commonwealth competition. "I usually practice two or three times a week," she answered as several of the girls questioned her skills. "I became interested in the game through my father (who also won several competitions when he was younger) and through work and effort, joined the Canadian team at age 16. At first I started on my own and won as many competitions as I could. Each win I earned ranked me higher and closer to top Canadian standards," she said.

**Shake hands**  
Violetta compared Red China with Canada in specific aspects of sporting attitudes and general dress. "After a hard game, whether they win or lose the Chinese always come over to you and shake your hand," she noted. "And it's for the sheer pleasure they have received from playing the match with you," she said. "I wore pant suits throughout the entire trip," Violetta noted, as the local girls smiled in amazement. "There are very few dresses worn in China and I found pant suits to be the most comfortable dress."  
Mr. Nesukaitis explained the "difference" between ping pong and tennis in a question and answer period following his daughter's speech. "Table tennis is a competitive sport that requires work to play and lots of practice to excel in. Ping pong is merely a trade name for the game."

**Piano, skit**  
Entertainment during the evening was provided by Cindy

Corp and Nancy Noble playing piano selections. Liz Richardson and Karen Trimble staged a skit entitled "Hole In The Bucket".  
Athletic awards were presented by teachers Mrs. S. Mitchell and Mrs. M. Carter. Accepting the awards for best junior (class 200 B) and senior (class 300 A) intramural classes were Karen Robinson and Anna

The banquet was termed "an overwhelming success" by all of the girls.
