Mrs. Peter Denboer, a member of the Evening Department, gave an interesting and enlightening account of the Toronto-Kingston Synodical which she attended in April at Belleville, in St. Columba presbyterian Church. The aims and purposes of the Women's Missionary Society are to unite the girls and women of the church in prayer and service at home and abroad. The treasurer of Synodical put forth a motion to have the fiscal year from September till June, thereby easing the financial difficulties which arise during slack, summer months. It was also suggested by a delegate that allocations be set according to active or associate membership. These matters must be decided by Council. **Involve men** A workshop was held in St. Andrew's church, the older Presbyterian church in Belleville. It was urged that all must educate and involve men as well as women as members and look ahead at our goal, "The World for Christ". The W.M.S. still has one-third of the representatives on the Board of Missions. Some aspects of missionary work are being assumed by governments on overseas missions but there is still much work for all. A film "Renewal" to be shown in Georgetown on May 19, will enlarge on this. Miss Gialo Kelly, executive director, National Missions, was a member of the study group, sponsored by the International Affairs Committee of the Canadian Council of Churches, which favoured the middle East last September and she showed slides of her trip. 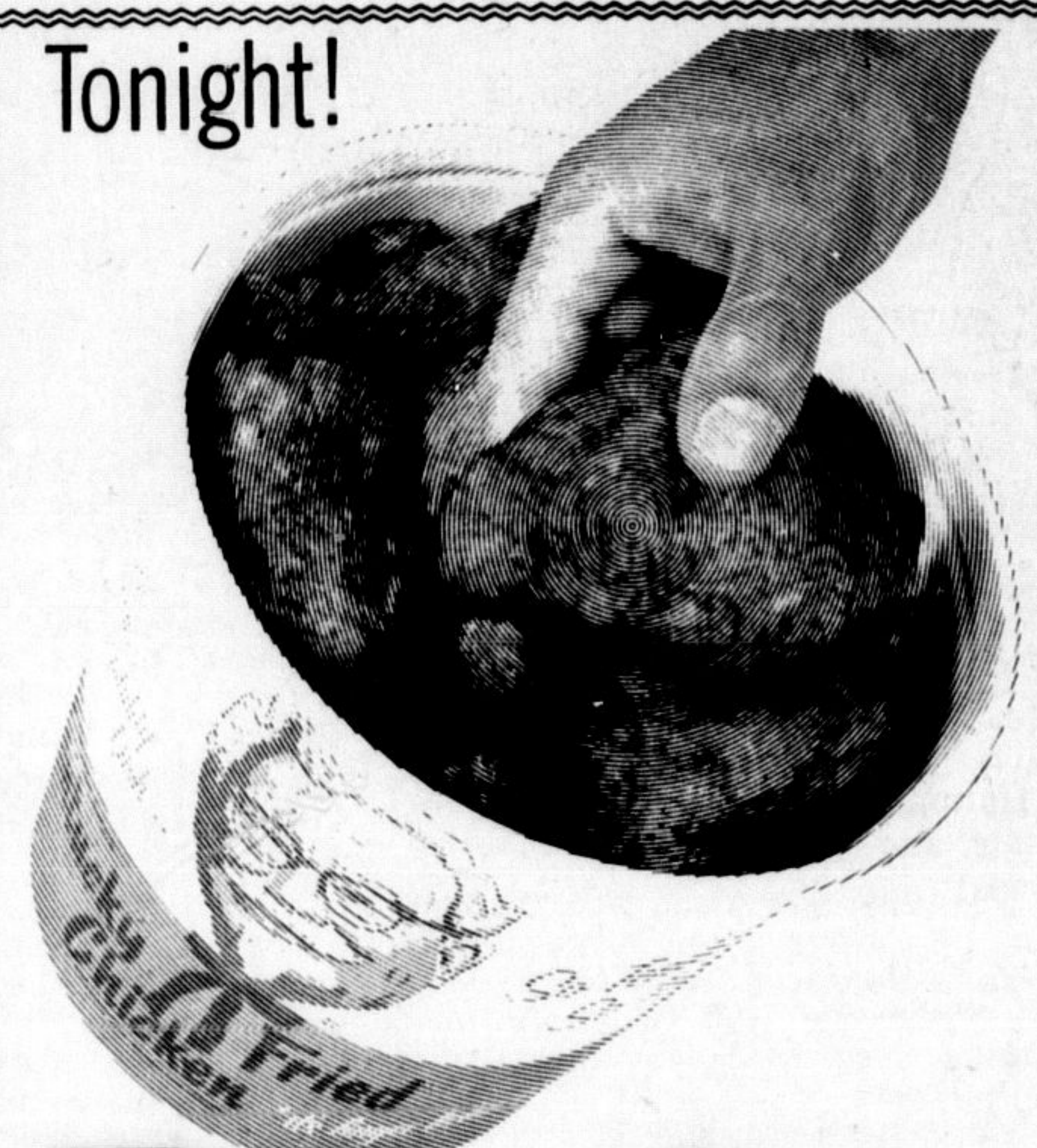
