# Chamber plans talk on security okays student financing course

A variety of business items faced directors of Milton Chamber of Commerce at their June executive meeting. Main item was the making of final plans for the open general meeting scheduled for Wednesday, June 16, when a speaker will talk on business security.

The meeting is a luncheon meeting at Charles Hotel dining room and will also feature a "beef session" where Chamber members can voice their opinions and air their beefs.

The Chamber has given the green light to retail committee co-chairman Nick Chuchnach and Bill Gallinger, who are anxious to start a course in personal financing for students at Milton District High School. The committee will discuss the course with school principal R. C. Hunter and hopes to get it underway in the fall. A similar program was a big success in Burlington recently, when experts in financing visited the school to lecture students on wise management of their money.

**Trip to Bermuda**  
Director Don Smith announced plans for the annual fund-raising draw which features a grand prize of a flight to Bermuda and a week's free holiday in a luxury hotel—for two. The draw will be made at a Chamber dance on Nov. 6 and the lucky winners will be able to take their trip (or \$500 cash instead of the trip) some time during next winter.

Directors are anxious to have new litter receptacles placed in the shopping areas and passed along some suggestions to Milton Council this week. The Chamber has offered to approach industries and service clubs for cash donations toward the cost of new litter boxes, after discovering it was too costly a project for the Chamber to finance.

**Place flowers**  
The beautification committee is brightening up the streets and Plaza area in another way. Five new flower boxes have been placed on Main St. and at the Plaza and Milton and District Horticultural Society has planted them with flowers. The Chamber has also endorsed town council's plans for a town-wide clean-up

Directors agreed to send a suggestion to downtown retailers, through the regular Chamber bulletin, asking them to have truck deliveries made at their

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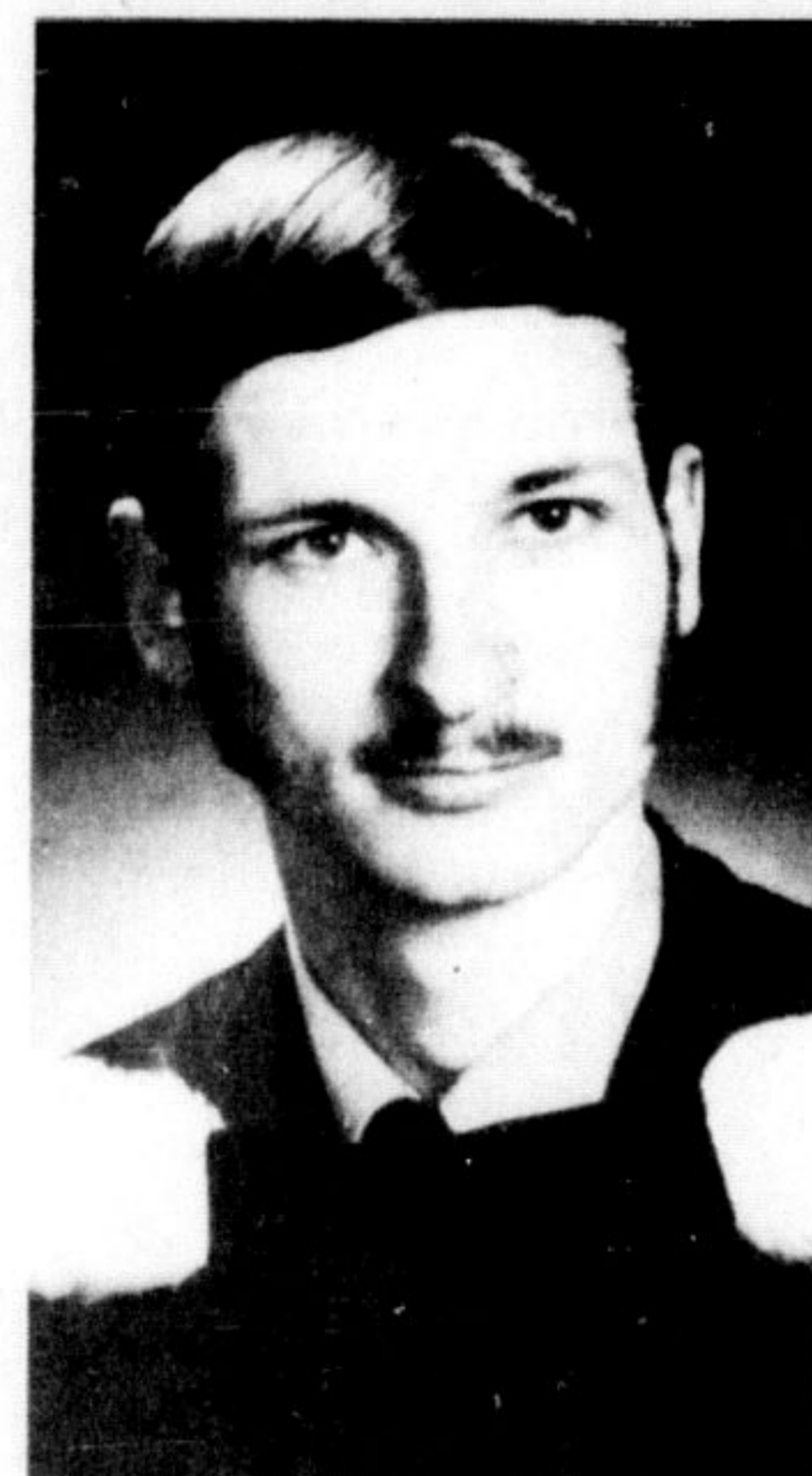

# Amass piles of old junk

Citizens of Upper Burlington were quite pleased with the response they received in the second annual clean-up held Saturday and Sunday in their area.

Five checkpoints were established at various areas in Upper Burlington and residents discarded old junk at the five drop-off points.

**Stop pollution**  
A spokesman for the group noted the clean-up was an excellent way to keep the junk garbage controlled behind farmyards and houses. "It's helping to avoid pollution in our own backyards," she said.

Last year the citizens of the area and the Upper Burlington Citizens' Forum organized a roadside clean-up, but decided against it this spring when the government announced plans of its SWEEP program to employ high school and university students throughout the summer. The junk clean-up was planned in connection with a similar program organized by the citizens in the town of Burlington, several weeks ago.

**Furniture, appliances**  
Farmers and area residents dropped off loads of junk at the checkpoints and old stoves, couches, chairs and fencing could be spotted amongst the rubble.

The Town of Burlington Works Department sent a truck to the five areas Monday to cart off the junk and garbage.

# Ambulance moves up

Changes in the ambulance system at Milton District Hospital will see the ambulance headquarters shifted from the basement to an alcove near the emergency ward and will see ambulance drivers taking a more active part in the work of the hospital.

At the hospital board's meeting last week, the property committee reported a stretcher bay in the hallway near emergency entrance will be expanded to make an office for the ambulance staffers. The men will assist in emergency ward, patrol the hospital in the evenings, control visitors using

the emergency entrance at nights and handle the hospital switch-board after 10 p.m.

# Public meeting Thursday on Guelph Line diversion

A public meeting will be held at Fairview School tomorrow night (Thursday) at 8 p.m. to discuss the proposed re-alignment of the Guelph Line between Colling Road and No. 10 Sideroad through Lowville.

The proposed re-alignment was the cause of some controversy last year. While the recommended re-alignment won't necessitate the removal of any homes it will cut across some private property and some land acquisition will be necessary.

After a series of ratepayers' delegations and opposition to the recommended and alternative proposals, the county roads committee headed by Reeve Gordon Gallagher said that when the work was going to be done, proposal D would be implemented.

**Swing west**  
Proposal D would see the road swing in a westerly direction behind the homes on Guelph Line south of the village. The project would run from Colling Road at the south to Eight Sideroad at the

north. The project is designed to avoid built-up areas.

While the cost of excavation in the recommended route is more expensive than some of the alternatives, the cost of property is less.

New chairman of the County

Roads Committee Reeve Jim Swantonborough has said he might favor leaving the work undone if that is what the people of Lowville want. There has been no date set for the work to commence, if it ever does commence.

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
