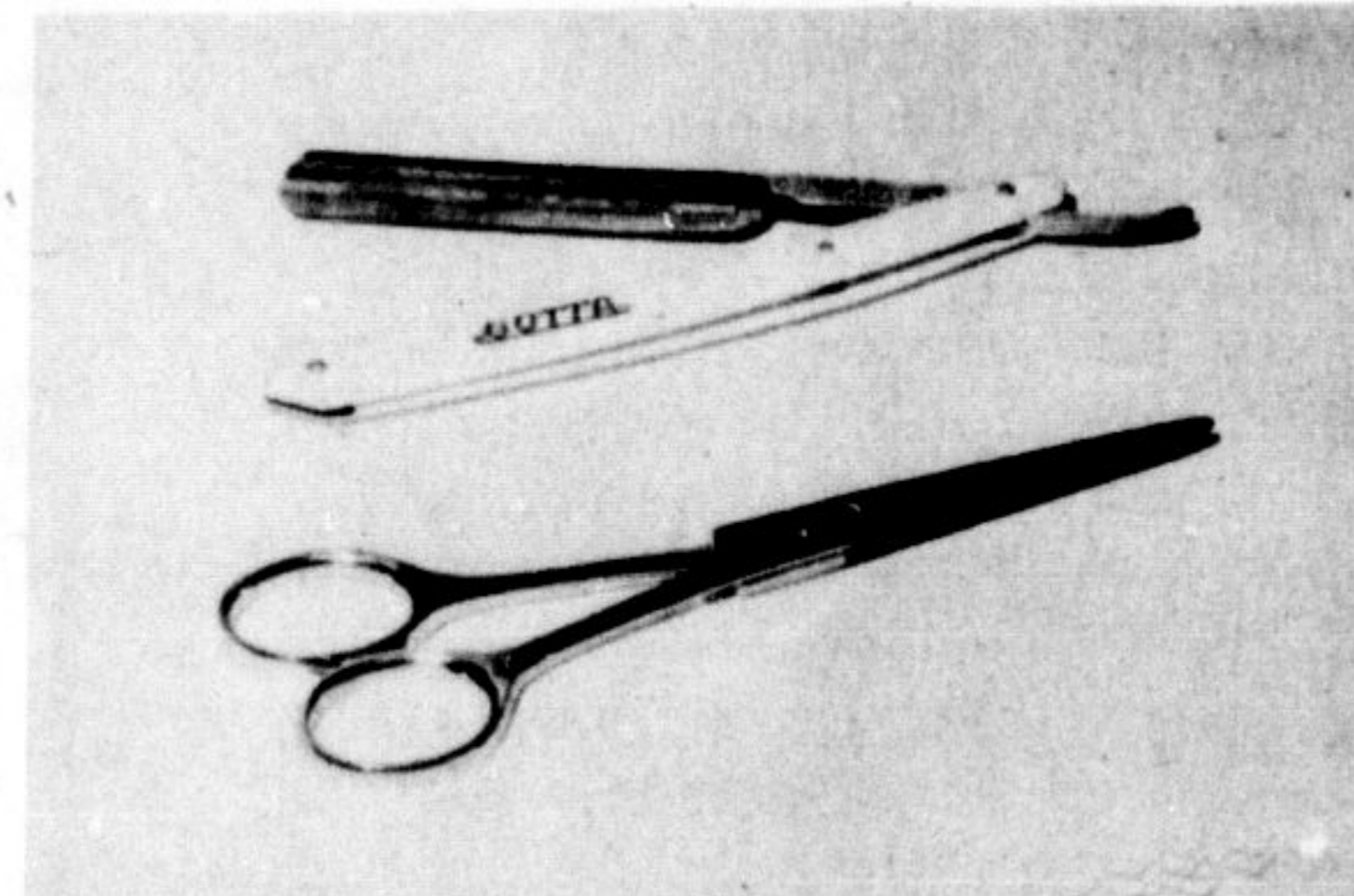
—Sidewalk sales were popular attention-getters in the downtown Milton area last week. There were 18 stores participating.
