### ONTARIO'S FLOWER GARDEN

The idea that roadsides must be ruthlessly sprayed each year has the Dick, Denyes and Bruce St. done away with most of the wildflowers along the byways of Southern schools. Ontario. Not until you travel the country roads in the more northern parts do you realize that some of our loveliest wildflowers still exist.

The first to appear in the Haliburtons, of course, is the trillium and unless this part of the province becomes urbanized, the beautiful floral emblem of Ontario will be with us for a while yet. There are areas along the highways that are spread with carpets of them. We regret that in a few years' time these roadsides may be pushed back for road improvements and cause many of the trillium to disappear.

Members of the Ontario Federation of Naturalists might be advised to undertake a project whereby they petition the government to transplant the threatened plants to a botanical garden for wild flowers. It is useless to take them to a home garden—the conditions are just not right for them. In any case, it is against the law for persons to pick or transplant the trillium.

The hillside where our cottage is located faces the wrong way for trilliums so we only have a few of them. But many other varieties compensate the lack of trilliums. Oddly enough the blooms on them are mostly white and are in flower early, before the trees leaf out and bury them in shade. The spiky foamflower (or coolwort), the bunchberry with its small blossoms that resumble the dogwood, and the tiny waxy bloom on the partridgeberry vine all have white flowers. An exception is the clintonia with base leaves almost like the lily-of-thevalley; it has a small cluster of miniature yellow lemon lilies on a tall stalk that will later bear large, hard blue seed berries.

### Natural rock garden

The natural rock garden in our woods contains several species of ferns. A source of wonder is the perfect cone of space that shows up in the centre of a fern when it first unfurls. The dainty patterns of each frond is another. Creeping ground cedar with its individual circle of fresh green, wintergreen vines and several types of mosses lend a most picturesque variety to the hillside area. We keep the sapling clipped out to allow room for the plants to spread and in the five years we have been there, their growth has amazed us.

Following closely the trillium is the false Solomon's Seal, with its huge cluster of feathery white bloom, tinged with pink, at the end of a leaf stalk patterned like a sumac but with waxy green foliage. Along the road the plant is so large it looks like a shrub but the leaf stalks emerge from the ground. In our woods we have several types of Solomon's Seal, one like the cultivated plant with white bell-like flowers hanging along the stalk like a bleeding heart. Just now the seed berries on these plants are turning red, adding a touch of color to the verdant green.

When driving along the winding road to the town of Dorset we noticed a heavy fragrance we couldn't identify. It turned out to be coming from the blossoms of the lowly milkweed that abounds up here. I guess we've never been so close to such a profusion of them before. Their fragrance excels that of the hothouse carnation in my opinion. When examining the blooms closely, we found the inevitable bee on each one for it contributes largely to the honey harvest.

Out where the sun shines the buttercups, daisies, black-eyed susans and Indian paint brush mingle their colors of yellow, white and orange. We saw several girls at the store with garlands of daisies in their hair and they were most attractive.

### Attractive bouquet

Once we gathered different varieties of wildflowers, together with dainty vines, to make an attractive bouquet for the table that lasted almost a week. These vines are not listed in any book we've seen, although some of the ferns and mosses that the books list as extinct abound in our woods.

On the power line that cuts across our property I found a nice surprise. A round bed of ferns circle the base of each pole as if a careful gardener had planted them there. On second thought, I guess the Master Gardener did. When they first put the line in years ago, the ground beneath was sprayed with brushkill to keep the trees from growing back. Now the wild plants are coming into their own again and we are reaping the benefits.

It may be necessary to squelch all the wild plants in some areas but I'm grateful that we can still enjoy Ontario's wildflower garden in some of the unspoiled places of the backwoods.
