

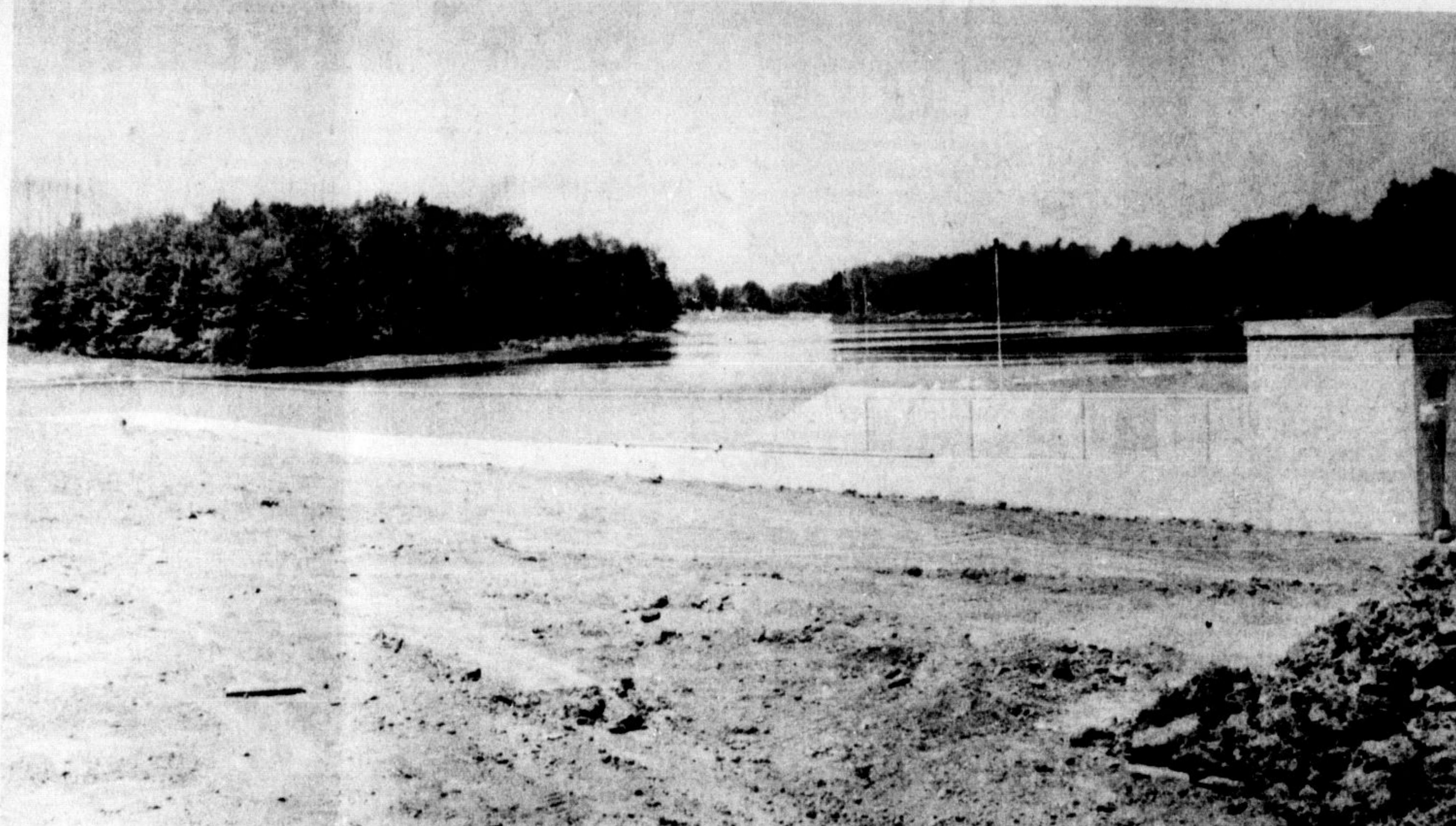
Omagh
