GOOD CANVASSERS JUST TOO FEW

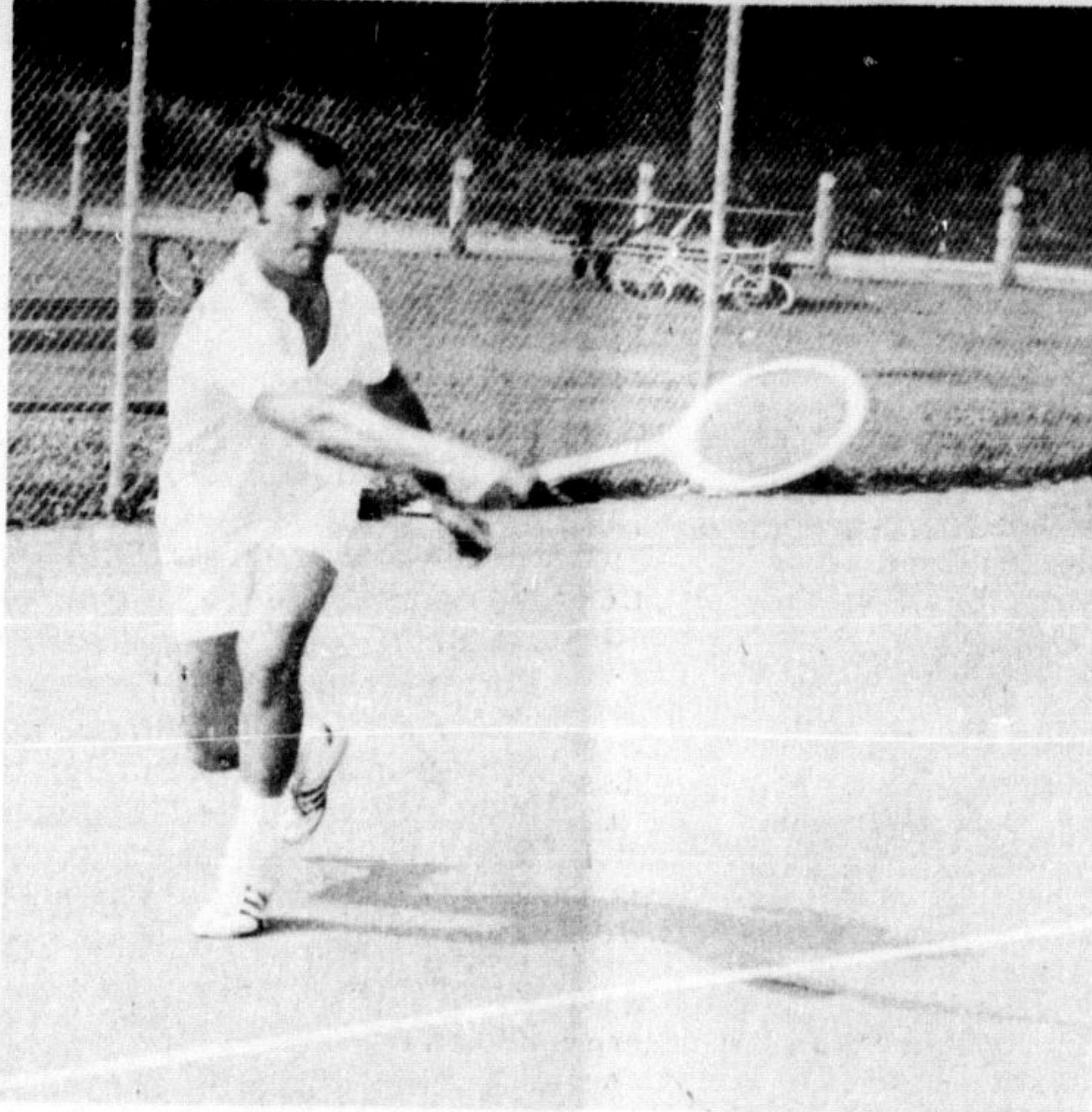
Dear Editor,

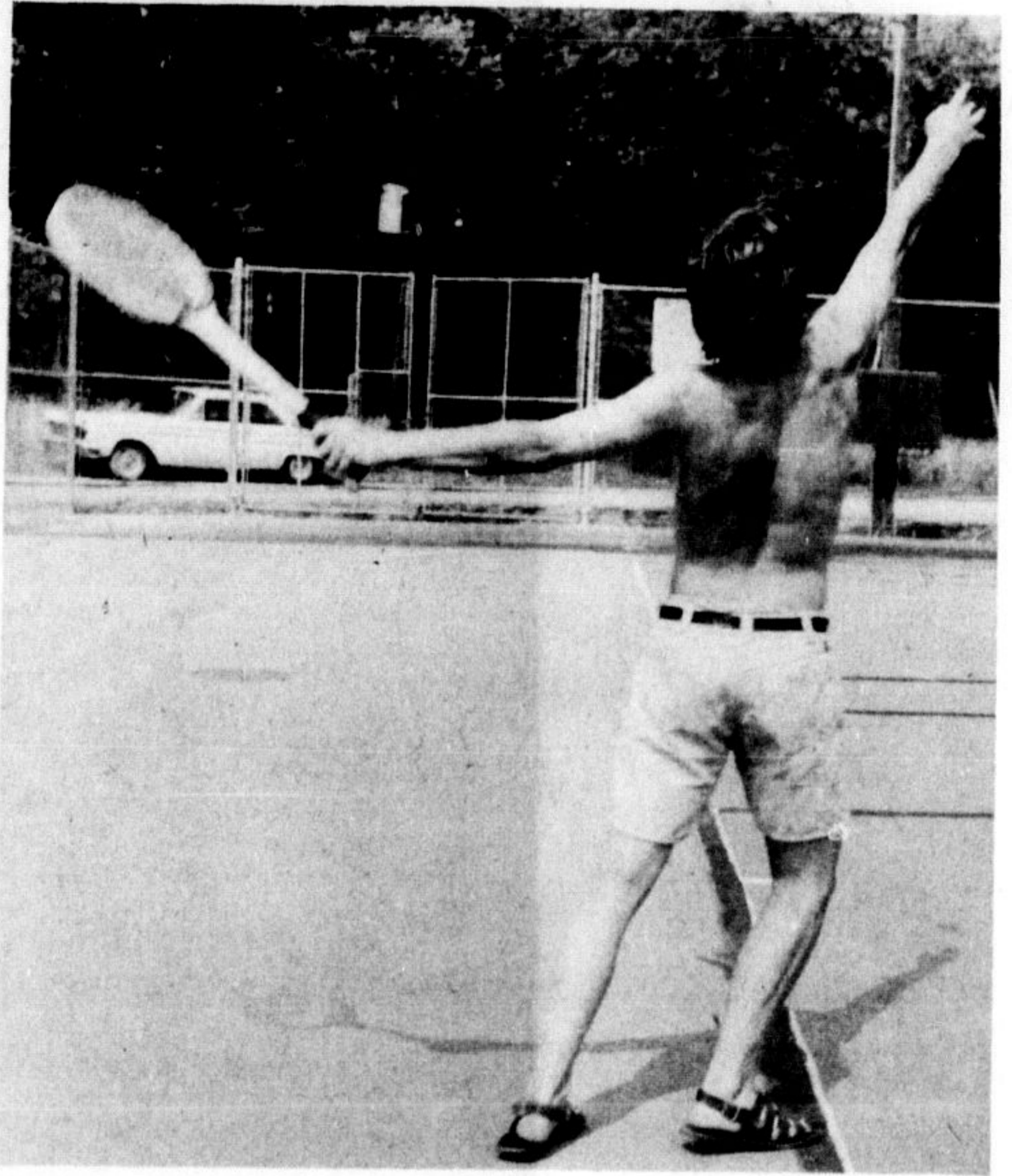

anybody except those people who live in that part of Oakville," he said.

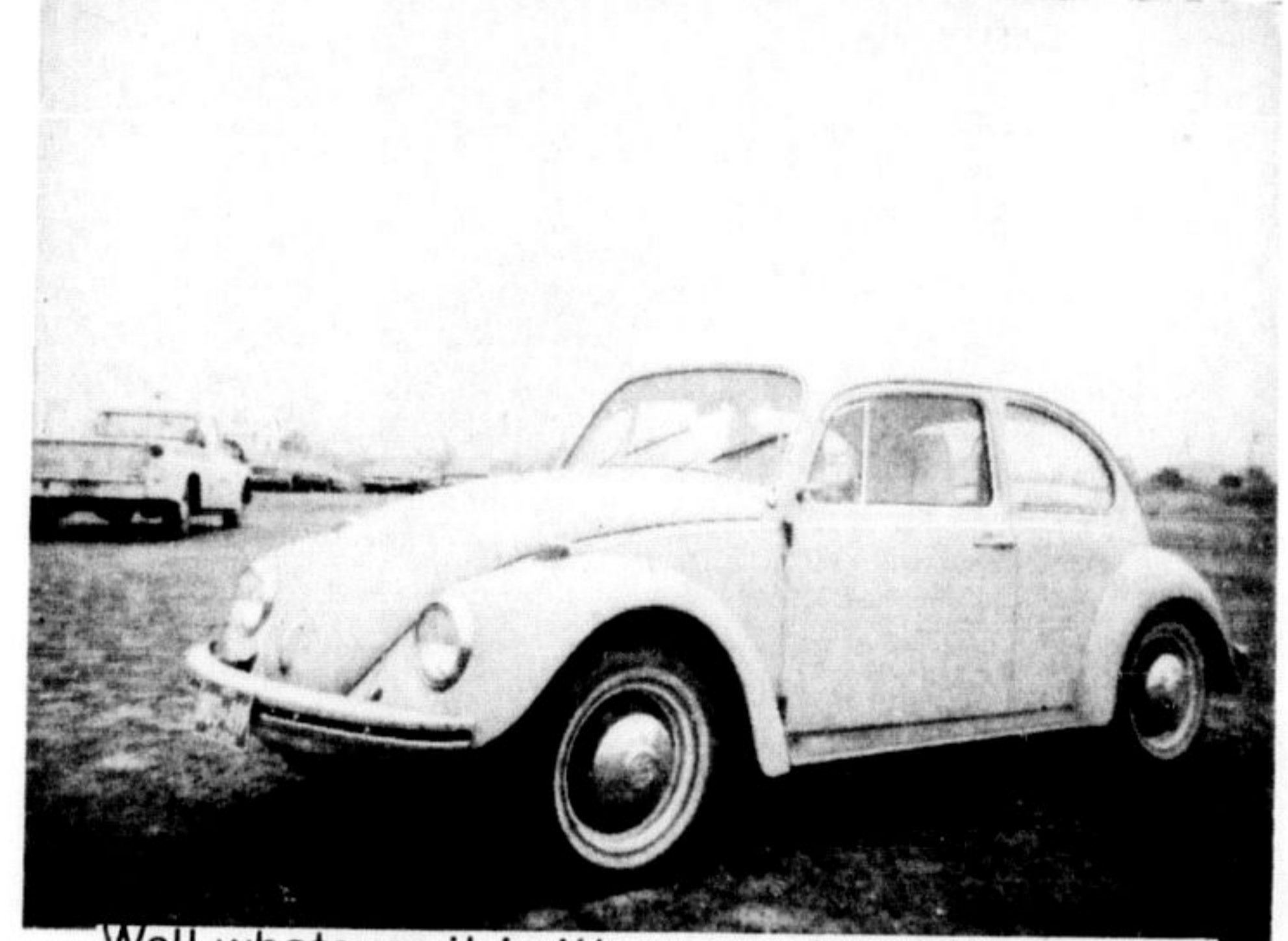
Director Jim Singleton said he didn't feel it would be a good area but said it would be a sound move to investigate the feasibility of the move. An investigation will take place.

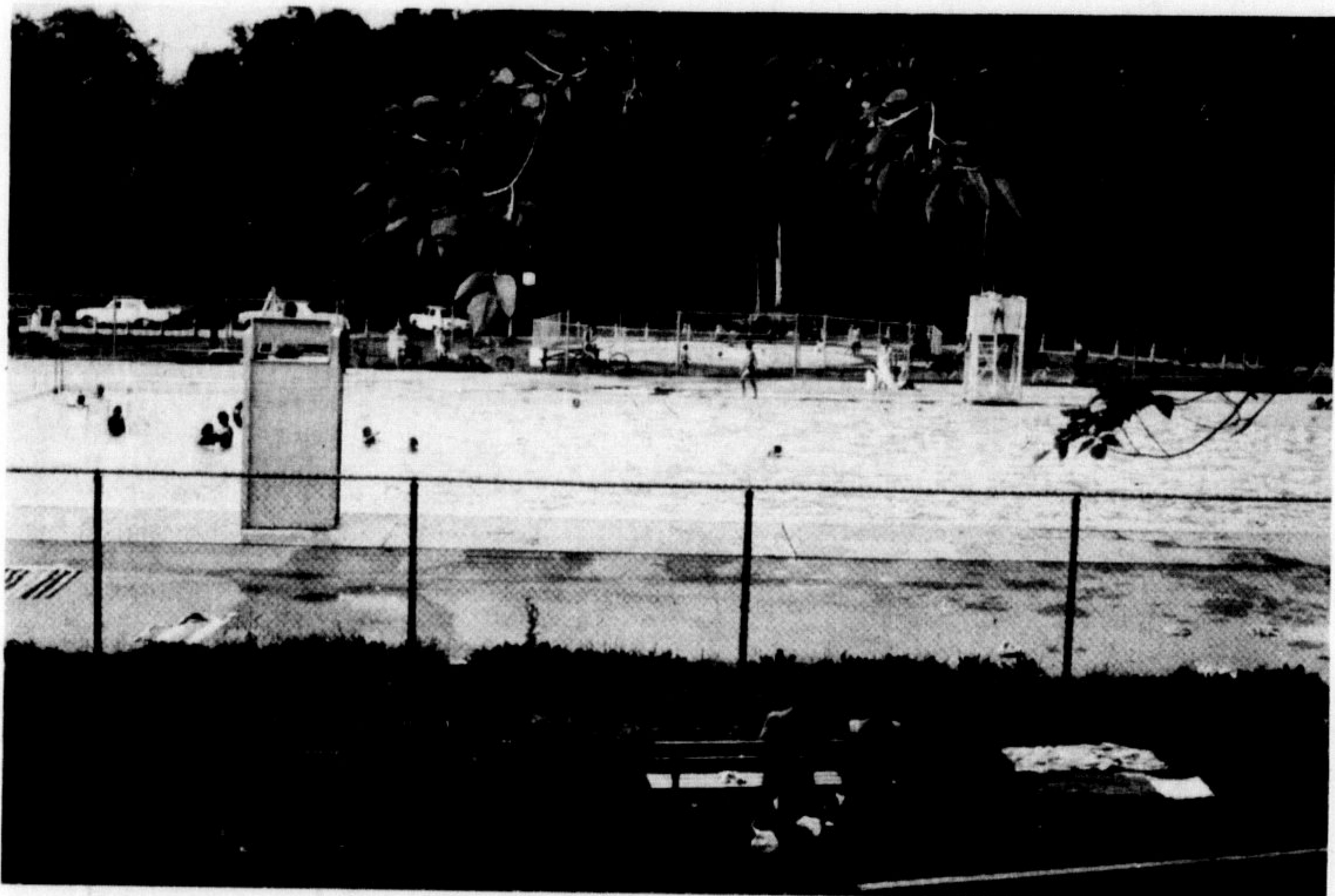
