If you could enjoy "the life of Riley" but those odd jobs keeps piling up, then POCO (POLLUTION Control) answer to your problems. Anyone with fields of grass to be cut, miles of fences to be painted or a herd of cattle to be rounded up, need not worry about the situation, but seek an answer from the cheery secretary in the Milton Recreation Office.

Extra work is no longer a problem when numerous able bodied high school students are seeking summer employment.

Thirty-five teens and young adults are currently registered in the summer employment program sponsored by the recreation committee, and although summer jobs are scarce, almost all the students in the program have been working at least once this summer

Not enough jobs "There are so many enrolled and not enough jobs available,"

said secretary Donna Straub. "Most of those enrolled have had at least one turn at a job this summer, but for girls especially, the jobs are limited."

Miss Straub along with recreation director Bob Martin and organizer Mickey Goutouski have arranged the employment

service to "help give teens something to do and keep them off the streets". "And so far the program has been working out farly well, "she said. "But we do need more jobs and at this time of year we're lucky to get one call

Service charge

The recreation committee receives 10 percent of whatever the student makes. "Although this is a little high we felt we needed to receive the 10 per cent to cover the cost of advertising and other expenses."

All calls for "help" are placed to the recreation office in the town hall where Miss Straub arranges a price with the client. "For jobs such as painting and cutting grass we bicker for an average price of \$1.35 for the student," she noted. "Prices vary and for babysitting, fees are 50 cents per hour and 75 cents for every hour after midnight. Depending on what the farmer will pay, we usually try to arrange a fee of \$1.50 to \$1.75 per hour for farm help."

The employment service is just one part of the voluntary summer program. Teens also enjoy arts and crafts, pollution projects and scuba diving as a salute to a busy
