Conservationists first

Trap shooters, hunters, fishermen and men and women who simply enjoy the outdoors gathered on the weekend at the Zone Six Convention of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters at the Halton Sportsmen's Club, Milton.

While hunting and fishing are the common interests which brought the delegates and club

members from six counties, it became apparent through discussions and business meetings that both the hunters and fishermen are conservationists first and hunters and fishermen second.

and keeping hunting and fishing alive for their children and grandchildren. Several of the delegates have been attending Federation conventions for more than 30 years now and although they no longer hunt, they have kept their interest in federation work and conservation of the waters and wilderness lands.

Dale Gartley, area conservation officer, Blake Evan, Doug Howell and Dan Mansell were among those representing the Department of Lands and Forests at the meeting.

Milton may be coming in for a gift of land. There's a possibility that lands north and south of Main St., west of the CNR elevated by-pass line, may be annexed to town.

Oakville Councillor Don Gordon is conducting a study to see how feasible the annexation might be. Apparently landowners in that area have asked Oakville

Council for permission to be annexed to Milton.

Reeve Ron Harris told members of Milton Council on Monday that Halton County Council has been asked for opinions and the county felt Milton should also be invited to comment on the proposal.

Councillors offered no comment.

Bow, arrow deer hunt considered in Halton

There is a strong possibility a deer season will be held in this area within the next year or so, but it won't be with guns. According to Department of Lands and Forests Official Dan Mansell there is a good chance of a Halton bow and arrow hunt.

In an interview Mansell said a similar project worked very well in the United States. "It's really great there. The public acceptance is good and this is something we have to value," he said.

Mansell said the harvest was very low with a bow season but the recreation value was very good. "You have to learn a lot before you bring down a deer with a bow and arrow," he noted. Mansell said the recreation value accounted largely for his department's desire to have a hunt. He said the actual kill wasn't really the whole purpose of the exercise.

He noted a changing philosophy in hunting. "More and more there is a growing interest in recreation hours, rather than shooting the biggest and most deer."

A bow hunting season is now in effect in Grey County, Manitoulin Island and Bruce Peninsula.

Public acceptance of bow hunting is better than the gun hunt because of a number of reasons. Bow hunters are not apt to travel in groups and the noise factor is lower.

Because of these and other reasons landowner-hunter conflicts are fewer. Mansell said intensive study was being done and he hoped an area would be selected for a trial period.

Campers

The convention was the first to be hosted by the Halton Sportsmen's Association and it was a family affair. Campers housed delegates on the grounds.

The event kicked off with a large corn roast Friday evening which saw the adults up until the wee hours of the morning.

Saturday morning was full of fun with delegates trying their hand at trap shooting, horse shoes and other games at the club while the youngsters enjoyed the scenic outdoors and played games of their own.

Tour of area

While the men knuckled down to the business meeting Saturday the women were taken on a tour of the area and visited Halton County Museum and Kelso Conservation Area among other points of interest.

Saturday evening saw a full house at the club, toe tapping and dancing to old time music and for those who hadn't completely exhausted themselves the night before, the dance went into the wee hours.

Paul Coulson president

Paul Coulson of Milton was elected president of Zone Six of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters at the convention held at Halton Sportsmen's Association clubhouse near Milton Sunday afternoon.

Coulson devotes as much time to preservation of hunting, fishing and conservation of wildlife as any man. Born a country boy, Paul was exposed to hunting and fishing at a young age.

He got active in club work many years ago and for the past six or eight years has been the

club delegate for the Halton Sportsmen to Zone conventions.

Very active He served for four years as second vice president, two years as first vice president and has now been elected to the highest office in the zone.

He is immediate past president of the Halton Association, chairman of the safe hunters course in Halton, chairman of the Halton Region Environmental Protective Association and for 11 years served on the board of directors with the Halton sportsmen.

George Chambers from London was elected first vice-president, Reg Robinson of Mitchell Fish and Game Club second vice-president and Gord Blake of Oakville Rod and Gun Club as secretary-treasurer.

Would give Unity Park funds to arena campaign

Funds earmarked for Unity Park at Milton's northern entrance will be turned over to the fund-raising campaign for a new town arena and community centre, if a recommendation by Milton Community Service Clubs is approved by its 12 member organizations.

Last week MCSC members held a meeting to review their losses on the June "Festival" dance, which was a flop to the tune of \$1,021.37 according to the treasurer's report. The loss left the group with \$1,798 in the bank. MCSC president called the dance "a disastrous loss".

The group was formed two years ago and ran a highly successful June dance in 1970. Funds were earmarked for development of the triangular park at the north of the OPP station, beside Highway 25. Their 1971 dance cost \$2,948 to operate and income was only \$1,927.

However the committee learned recently that development of the park will be held up for at least 18 months due

to road construction in the area. Meanwhile the Lions Club started promoting a town-wide campaign for funds for a second arena combining a community centre with it.

When members met last week to review the dance and hear the Lions Club's proposal for the arena and community centre, it was unanimously agreed that Milton Community Service Clubs group would be the best organization to spearhead the joint co-operation of town organizations.
