W.I. resolution urges waste program

The resolutions program was conducted by Mrs. Lloyd Stokes and Mrs. Len Andrews. An article by Bill Smily on the Old Junk Man was read by Mrs. Stokes, and also a clipping from Nature and Wild Life on "Stop

Killing our Oceans". The roll call "an improvement you would like to see in your community" was taken in a written form and read later with some very good suggestions such as a caution light at the busy corner before

another accident occurs.

"Whereas recycling or re-use of materials is the only long term solution for any waste disposal.

"Therefore be it resolved that the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada, request the government of Canada to set a definite policy and program on the disposal of solid waste and

"Further be it resolved that the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada request the Government of Canada to give priority to recycling and reconversion as a treatment of waste materials and

"Further be it resolved that the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada request the Government of Canada to provide incentives to private industries to encourage them to recycle waste and to use recycled materials and

"Further be it resolved that the

Federated Women's Institutes of Canada urge the Government of Canada to make greater use of mass media communications to alert the public to the ecological and environmental problems and to solicit public co-operation."
