THE TORONTO DECLARATION OF CONCERN

We are horrified by the events of recent months in East Pakistan which have resulted in one of the major disasters in man's history. Millions of refugees have fled in the wake of atrocities and military operations which continue to this day.

The spectre of famine threatens those who remain in East Pakistan. In India, the influx of a rising tide of some 7.5 million refugees to date has created grave problems.

The present situation is a threat to peace both in the subcontinent of South Asia and throughout the world, with danger of great power involvement in a familiar pattern of escalation. In spite of repeated warnings, including those of Secretary-General U. Thant, the world remains largely indifferent. The staggering cost of the refugee operations has been left predominantly as a burden for India to carry. No effective political pressures have been brought to bear by the world community to end the mounting tragedy.

This conference calls for an immediate end to all killings. This can be achieved only in the context of a political settlement. There can be no lasting political solution without the democratic consent of the people of East Pakistan.

The secret military trial of Sheik Mujibar Rahman offends against the principles of the rule of law, outrages world opinion, and militates against the possibility of conciliation. His execution would end hopes of a peaceful settlement of the crisis.

In the longer view there can be no solution that does not allow the refugees to return and live in security in their villages and homes.

All evidence points to the certainty of famine in East Pakistan by October. Food must be supplied from outside and distributed directly to rural areas on a neutral basis under the supervision and administration of a greatly augmented United Nations staff with the mandate and facilities necessary for effective action. We urge the Government of Pakistan and the leaders of the Bangla Desh movement to cooperate with this emergency humanitarian program.

We urge all governments:

1. To terminate immediately all military military deliveries to Pakistan; 2. To suspend all economic aid to

Pakistan: 3. To channel all possible resources into

a massive emergency program for famine relief in East Pakistan directed and administered by the U.N.: 4. To make firm continuing commit-

ments to share fairly the economic burden of supporting the refugees in India;

5. To intervene to save the life of Sheik Mujibar Rahman. We appeal with the utmost urgency to all

people in all countries to prevail upon their governments to act while there is still time.

CLARIFIES LIBRARY'S PRESENTATION TO COUNCIL

Dear Mr. Downs:

On Sept. 20 the Library Board presented to the Milton Council certain statistics to underline the necessity of a new library with up-to-date facilities.

It was with regret that I noted that The Champion failed to report the facts accurately.

In the Library Board's presentation it was pointed out that the Library should be the information centre of the town, with reference material, micro-film, clipping files, etc., for use by students, teachers, and the business community. It should house a local history collection and have facilities for art, music and drama programs. The present library accommodation does not make any of this possible.

The presentation went on to show how far below the minimum Canadian Library Standards, Milton's facilities are. We have in our library on Main Street, 1,500 square feet of floor area—The Canadian Library Standards lay down a minimum floor area for a town the size of Milton as 4,500 square feet. The minimum amount of shelving, the Canadian Library Standards state, for our town's present population should be 2,000 linear feet—we have approximately 1,200 linear feet. Nevertheless into this ridiculously inadequate space we have, at present 16,000 books—the only statistic which measures up to Canadian Library Standards.

Town planners estimate within the next few years the population of Milton will rise to 15,000 people. With this figure in mind the Library Board gave their projection of the requirements for a new library—A library with a minimum floor area of 10,500 square feet, housing a collection of 30,000 books.

I am sure The Canadian Champion fully appreciates the benefit of a good library service to every member of the community and will want to have these facts accurately presented.

FURTHER FACTS

ABOUT FLUORIDATION

Dear Sir:

Please allow me space in your paper to carry the discussion of fluoridation of water

What is fluoridation? Fluoridation means the adding of a powerful cumulative poison, usually sodium fluoride or sodium silicofluoride, to the water supplies of a community for the prupose of reducing tooth decay in children. The recommended dosage is one part

fluoride to one million parts of water

Where did it originate? It seems to have originated as a result of a report by Dr. George W. Heard, a dentist of Hereford, Texas, more than 30 years ago. He announced that the soil in the Deaf-Smith County was so rich in minerals that there was hardly a toothache in the county. Twenty three years later other dentists investigated and concluded that it might be

due to the fluoride in the water. Dr. Heard himself says: "With this conclusion I do not concur. Fluorine in water is a deadly poison, inorganic, and cannot be properly assimilated by the human organism. It is purely an inorganic drug. Fluorine in soil and water is not a food, but plant life grown in this soil converts this mineral, which is a poison, into food values which prevent disease. (U.S. 83rd Congress Hearing on H.R. 234I, page 5c).

What is fluorine? Fluorine is one of the most active elements known to man—so active that it is never found in nature, and can be produced only with great difficulty in a laboratory because it explodes with great violence upon upon contact with air or water.

What are fluorides?

Fluorides are the salts of fluorine. They occur as by-products in two large industries: the aluminum and chemical fertilizer industries. They have been used for many years as rat and roach poison, being tasteless and odorless.

The most poisonous of these fluorine salts is sodium fluoride, used in water fluoridation. Less poisonous is the more stable calcium fluoride found in nature; and the least poisonous are the organic calciumphosphorous fluorides found in foods. What is claimed for fluoridation?

That it will reduce tooth decay in children by 66 per cent. Was fluoridation tried experimentally?

Yes, in Newburgh, N.Y. and Grand Rapids, Mich. starting in 1945. What do the Newburgh dentists say? Some noted a slight improvement. All

agreed that 30 per cent of the children born

since fluoridation started had mottled teeth (Newburgh News, Dec. 14 / 55 after 10 years of fluoridation).

Do fluorides cause gum disease? Dr. H. K. Box of the University of Toronto, and Dr. G. C. Geiger, Florida State Dental Officer, observed a marked increase in peridontal (gum) disease from protracted intake of minute amounts of fluoride in water. This disease, considered more serious than tooth decay, causes loss of teeth at an early age.

Is fluorine a cumulative poison? Yes. Any good medical reference book will confirm this.

Radio-active tracer studies by Dr. Wallace Durbin at California University proved that no matter how small the amount swallowed, some of it is always retained in body. Bones of old animals always contain more fluorine than bones of young animals.

Can fluoride dosage be controlled? No. The case for fluoridation is based upon the premise that everyone drinks about four glasses of water daily, which at 1ppm contains 1 mg. of fluorine.

Smelter workers and diabetics drink many times the so-called average amount of water. They may get 10 times the recommended dosage. The child who drinks mostly fruit juice or milk may get almost

Prof. James J. Rae, Associate Professor of Chemistry, University of Toronto, reported in Toronto Globe and Mail, Nov. 1,

"It is impossible, at this date, to say how much harm and disease will result by adding fluoride to our water since none of the artificial fluoride experiments has gone on long enough."

Dr. R. L. Scott, executive member of the Brant County of Ontario Dental Society, reported in the Globe and Mail, Feb. 4 / 60: "The protection given teeth by fluorine is very slight, and without some thought to diet

control, it is absolutely useless.' Cambridge, Massachusetts, last Nov. 5 voted out fluoridation, thus becoming the 175th U.S. community to reject compulsory fluoridation after a trial.

The American Medical Association has repeatedly refused to endorse fluoridation. The following is a resolution of the

Association of American Physicians and

Surgeons: Resolution on use of water supply as vehicle for drugs: Whereas, the right to determine what shall be done to one's own body is fundamental, and,

Whereas, water is necessary for life, and, public supplies for water,

Therefore, be it resolved that the assembly and House of Delegates of the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons, Inc., in regular session assembled in San Francisco, California this 12th day of April, 1958, condemn the addition of any substance to public water supplies for the purpose of affecting the bodies or the bodily or mental functions of the consumers.

And be it further resolved that copies of this resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, the members of Congress, the Governors of the several states, and the mayors of our principal cities, and released to the media of public information.
