Kate McLaren was the winner of the "money bunny" which is the mascot for "Funds Unlimited". A representative for

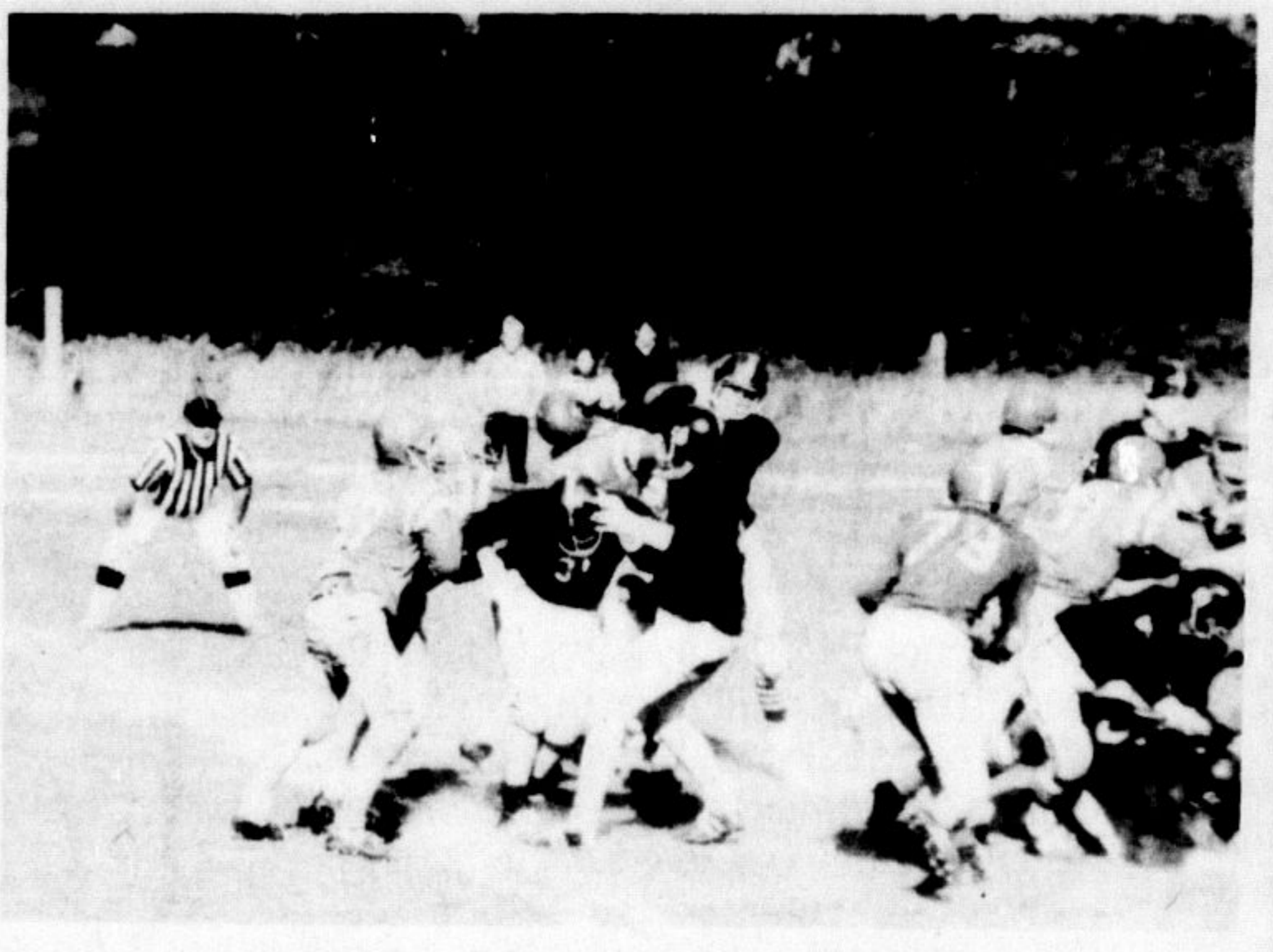

preservative but provides no benefits. The people who object to a beneficial amount of fluoride being added to our water supply are never heard to condemn or do without these foods. No one is asking Jim Snow to have iodine removed from our table salt. No one is recommending the revoking of pasteurization laws. The benefits of both of these are well known. Some people feel that because their children's teeth have been painted with fluoride and a remarkable reduction in cavities has been noted, that this method should possibly be adopted. This method decreases the amount of tooth decay by 30 to 40 per cent as compared with 65 per cent reduction with fluoridated water. This treatment must be given by a dentist or dental technician and it would be impossible to find sufficient personnel to provide all children with this benefit. The fluoridation of the water is also more economical. No one claims that fluoride in any form will reduce the incidence of tooth decay 100 per cent and it certainly does not replace the tooth brush, however, what a boon this is and one we cannot deny our children.

The younger the child is when fluoride is added to the water, the better for the child.

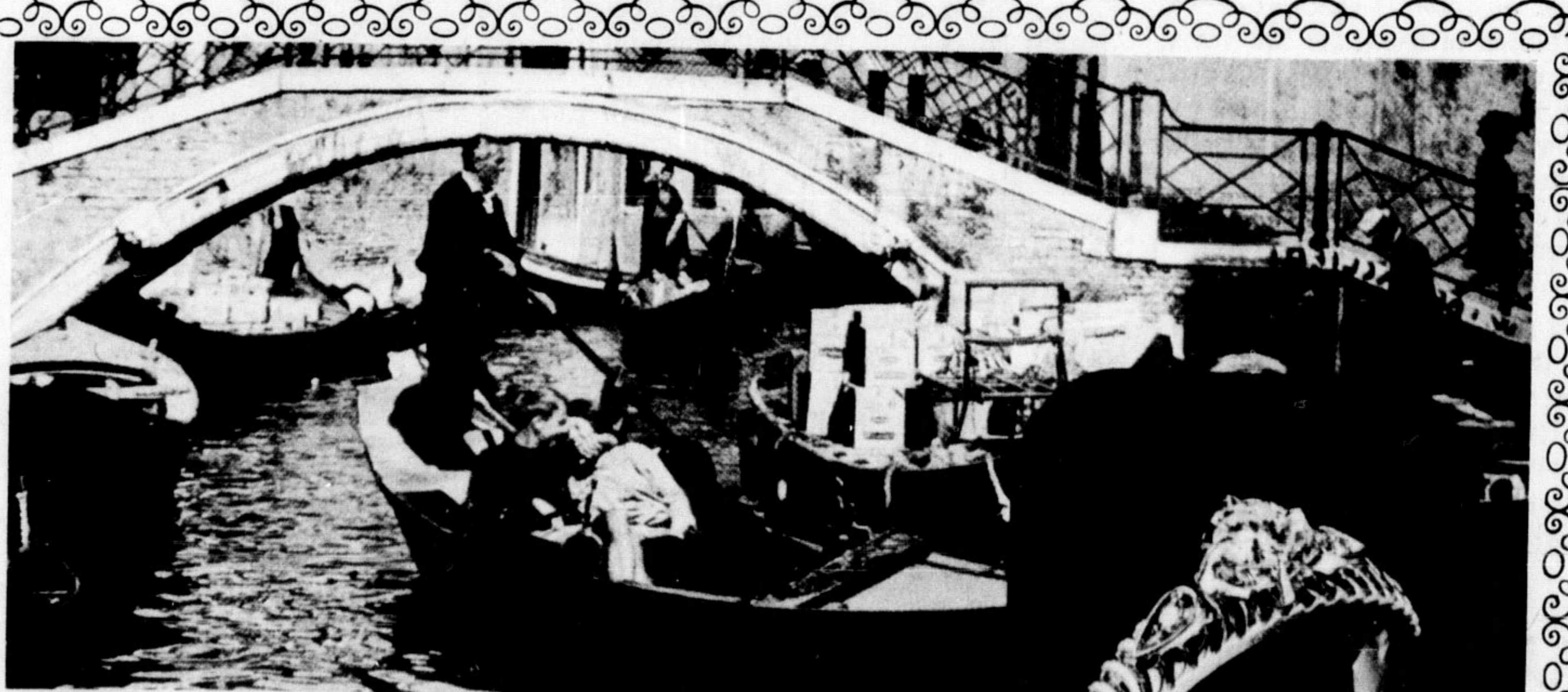
