Arnold sets surging pace for Flyers' first victory

John Arnold made his first appearance as a centreman Friday night against the Dundas Blues and it looked like he'd been playing centre all his life. Arnold, with linemates Gary Hunt and Dave Heipel scored a total of 14 points while the Nadalin Electric Flyers scampared to a 9-3 win against Dundas.

Arnold became the first Flyer to score three goals in a game and he picked up two assists. Heipel scored two goals and three assists and Hunt one goal and three assists. Arnold, Heipel and Hunt were chosen as the three stars in that order for their performance.

Plenty of firsts

Flyers have never looked better than they did Friday night. It was the first game of the season where the Flyers had enjoyed a lead, even for a short period of time. Once they had the taste of sitting in the driver's seat they weren't about to give it up.

It was also the first game where the club managed to get through the whole game without a major penalty being called. In fact they limited their time in the sin bin to 20 minutes for 10 infrac-

tions. John Arnold managed a hat trick in that respect as well, going off for three minor penalties. The only man to see more time in the sin bin than Arnold was Tony Horvath of Dundas who sat out five of Dundas' 11 minor penalties.

Flyers hustled and led 3-0 midway through the first period on goals by Brad Butterworth, John Arnold and Gary Hunt.

Tom Packham put Dundas on the score sheet when he penetrated the Milton defence and beat Terry Mastine on a

breakaway. Mastine had no chance.

Heipel restored Milton's three goal lead in the second period when he drilled a blazing shot in on the short side. Arnold scored twice in the second period after Wayne Urban counted on a

Dundas power play. The score at the end of the second period was 6-2.

Power play

Heipel scored on a power play from Hunt and Hugh Marshall in the third period to make it 7-2. Richard Murray scored on a picture play. Keith Bridgman carried the play into the Dundas zone and pushed the puck to Murray in the slot. Murray was knocked off balance but golfed the puck into the net all in one motion.

Ruddy Thomas converted a pass from Brian Beaumont at the 9:38 mark of the third period to conclude the Milton scoring.

Ron Heaslip, Wayne Urban and Tom Packham scored Dundas goals.

"Heipel, Hunt and Arnold were well chosen stars" coach Carl Hymers said after the game.

"They went out there in the first period and they wanted to win. They started the ball rolling and kept it going".

Our guys brought the puck out of our own net with authority and the defence played especially well when they were a man short," Hymers remarked.

It was anybody's game until Hespeler's third period outburst. The Flyers skated with the home club and controlled a fair portion of the play. Overall, Mastine was called upon to make 44 saves and Neath made 29 stops in the Hespeler net.

Eighty-eight minute in penalties were called during the game. Hespeler sat out 40 minutes in all, serving one misconduct and 15 minors while Milton had 14 minors and two misconducts called.

Jeff Lockridge and John Arnold sat out 10 minute-misconducts for Milton and Jerry Mallard for Hespeler.
