Fears many left off

Check list or you'll miss vote

Unless Miltonians take the time to check the voters' list for the upcoming municipal election, there is a very good chance many will not be able to vote in the December election.

According to clerk Jack McGeachie a great deal of confusion has been caused in preparing the voters' list since the assessment function has been taken over by the province.

Assessment figures According to assessment figures all but a few of the 90 suites in Mayfair Apartments are vacant. In fact many of them are

rented but the occupants won't be on the voters' list unless they are on the assessment roll.

Two years ago there were 3,470 municipal voters. With increased population and at least 300 more people due to the lowering of the age of majority, that figure should have increased considerably. However there are only 3,454 persons listed as municipal voters at the current time.

He noted any new persons having moved to town since April may not be on the list. Those who are not on the list should fill out a

form at town hall to see that their appeal is processed. Residents of town who have moved to another home within the town may be listed at their old address. Those persons will be able to vote only in the ward where their first home is located.

Appeals must be filed by Nov. 15. After that date no appeals can be launched.

Municipal voters will choose a town council and hydro commission as well as cast ballots on the questions of fluoridation and Sunday opening of pool halls. The election is Dec. 6.
