Historical plaque marks 1921 discovery of insulin

On Monday, Oct. 25, an historical plaque commemorating the discovery of insulin was unveiled at the Medical Sciences Building, 1 King's College Circle on the University of Toronto campus. This plaque is one of a series being erected throughout the province by the Ontario Department of Public Records and Archives, acting on the advice of the Archaeological and Historic Sites Board.

Monday's ceremony was sponsored jointly by the Canadian Diabetic Association and the University of Toronto Insulin Committee with chairman Dr. Albert Fisher as program chairman. Others taking part in the ceremony were Dr. A. L. Chute, Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, University of Toronto; Professor J. Maurice

Careless, Co-Chairman of the Province's Historic Sites Board; Harold Alexander, President of the Canadian Diabetic Association; the Hon. Allan Grossman, M.P.P., Ontario's Minister of Trade and Development; Dr. R. E. Haist, Chairman of the Department of Physiology. The plaque was unveiled jointly by Dr. Charles H. Best, one of the discoverers of insulin, and Lady Banting, widow of Dr. Frederick Banting.

The plaque inscription reads as follows: "THE DISCOVERY OF INSULIN 1921: At a meeting of the University of Toronto Physiological Journal Club held on Nov. 14, 1921, in a building which stood on this site, Frederick Banting, an orthopaedic surgeon and Charles H. Best, a recent graduate in physiology and bio-

chemistry, made the first public announcement of their discovery of a therapy for use in the treatment of "diabetes mellitus". On Jan. 11, 1922, Insulin, originally called Isletin, was administered to 14-year-old Leonard Thompson, at the Toronto General Hospital. The dramatic improvement of the patient and widespread publicity during the next six months brought the scientists universal acclaim. Their discovery, the culmination of nine months of intensive effort, has prolonged the lives of millions of diabetics throughout the world."

To all Municipal Electors within the Town of Milton

Do you wish to vote at this year's Municipal Election for the election of a Council and Hydro Commission, plus the questions of Fluoridation and Sunday opening of Pool Rooms

Due to the takeover of the Assessment Function by the Province, I have had a great deal of difficulty in preparing this year's Voters Lists, and at this point I feel a great number of names could be missing from the list.

As an example, approximately forty apartments which are occupied are not on the Voters Lists as they were not enumerated by the Assessor.

Any new people who have taken up residence since April or who have moved to a new location in Town could also be missed or still listed at their previous address.

The new Age of Majority Act now permits those 18 years of age and over to vote "Provided they are Owners or Tenants of Property."

People who do not own property or do not rent premises are still not permitted to vote regardless of their age.

Voters Lists are located throughout the Town in numerous stores, in the Post Office, Legion and at the Town Office in the Town Hall.

I strongly urge all persons to check the lists and if your name is not on the list please come to the Town Office at 251 Main Street, East, to enter the necessary appeal to have your name added to this year's Voters Lists.

The last date for filing an appeal to have your name added to the Voters Lists is November 15th, 1971; after this date, no names can be added.

Please check the lists to make sure you are included. On election day it is too late and you will, therefore, be unable to vote.
