## Dr. Burnside speaks to Holstein farmers

By Henry J. Stanley The Halton Holstein Breeders met at the farm of Gordon Mc-Donald, R.R. 3 Georgetown on Wednesday afternoon Nov. 24. The meeting commenced with a class of four, three-year-old heifers to be placed. Mr. Mc-Donald then discussed the breeding and management of his holsteins.

Guest speaker was Dr. Ted Burnside, Department of Animal

and Poultry Systems, University of Guelph. Dr. Burnside discussed the main reasons why cows are culled in a herd. The factors over which the farmer has some control are low production, feet and legs, and mammary system, thus in selecting a bull to use on your herd, special emphasis should be placed on these categories. He also encouraged farmers to raise purebred holsteins and to put the

cows on test. Example

Taking one of the cows in the McDonald herd as an example, Dr. Burnside predicted the potential of a calf born to that cow and sired by a number of different bulls available in Ontario. The value of using bulls plus proven for both type and production was emphasized. The meeting concluded with donuts


