## Snow removed from streets is dumped away from creeks

Milton's town works department is doing everything possible to prevent an excess of salt from being dumped into the great lakes. Unlike some cities, the town works department dumps snow away from creeks which lead eventually to the lake.

Town works superintendent Bruce McKerr explained the town would use about 60 tons of

salt in 600 tons of sand as a de-icing agent this winter, unless a severe storm hit the area or the town has a prolonged cold period where icy roads had to be treated. In that case the stockpile would have to be replenished.

#### Control dumping

Recently Minister of the Environment George Kerr urged municipalities to control

dumping of snow that had been taken from roads. Studies show chloride levels in the great lakes have increased threefold since the turn of the century.

The minister urged that stockpiles be enclosed to prevent leaking and the salt seeping into the ground and eventually to a watercourse.

Mr. McKerr said the town uses the town dump most of the time but on occasion has used Martin's Flats and the fairgrounds. Both of these areas however have been too soft recently to take town trucks in.

Each year snow is trucked from Main St., streets leading off Main St. and some of the town's narrow arteries. A straight salt solution is applied on Main St. but that is the only place. Mr. McKerr said no sand was used there because it was being tracked around and making a mess of stores in the downtown area.

## Youth council is formed, P. Perrott is chairman

Paul Perrott was chosen to head the Milton Youth Council at the first meeting of the council Monday night. Of the 16 young people that attended the meeting at the home of Mrs. Marjorie Powys on Mill St. Kevin Smith was elected co-chairman and Brian Green, Jane McNeil, Craig Smith and Tanis Wildfong were elected to the advisory committee. Tanis will serve as secretary treasurer.

Milton Police Chief Ray Andress and Optimist President John Perrott both attended. In a brief press conference after the meeting members of the advisory board outlined some of the objectives and ambitions of the membership.

#### Like to help

Their objectives are wide and vary from establishing liaison between the police force and the town council and operating garbage drives to clean up the town.

"We'd really like to help the community," Tanis Wildfong said. She and chairman Perrott indicated that a coffee house, dances, and motorcycle rallies were all things they'd like to establish.

The group was eager to find a way to use school facilities for recreation after school hours. Perrott said other attempts to use school facilities had been put down by the principal.

The young people were happy about an offer Chief of Police Ray Andress made. "He said instead of everyone standing around Main St. pelting eggs we could go to a corner and throw them at him Perrott said adding that he and his council planned to charge a fee for that privilege on Halloween.

#### No arena

While the group seemed eager to support community efforts and

in particular those of the Milton MiltonCommunity Service Clubs they couldn't see the need for a second arena.

Both Kevin Smith and Tanis Wildfong suggested there was a need for an enclosed swimming pool and a community centre but suggested ice time was still being rented to out of town people in the old rink.

Smith suggested something along the lines of an O'Keefe Centre for Milton would suit the needs of more people than a second rink.

Smith saw the group as a protector of legal rights for individuals who don't know their rights.

#### Up to us

Perrott said the town council, the Optimist Club and the police department had offered help. "We have no shortage of adult help. It is up to us now. It depends how much we put in it."

The group was disappointed at what they felt was a poor turnout and encouraged people of any age group to attend meetings and take part in activities and

discussions with the group.

"Part of the reason 'Youth on the Move' failed was it wasn't ready to accept suggestions, but we are," Craig Smith suggested. He said the group didn't pretend to plan for the community but rather to interpret the needs.

#### Will help

Police Chief Ray Andress said he'd go along with the group and help if he could providing they were willing to work for the benefit of the community and themselves.

In connection with egg throwing and him as the target all he asks is a reasonable chance.

The formation of the council has come about as an indirect result of the Halloween disturbance. Milton council hopes the group will provide liaison between town council and the youth.
