This was the opinion of Don Wilson, Sheridan College's Family Life Consultant who spoke to a small but enraptured audience consisting of members of the Milton Co-Operative Nursery School.

During his talk, which was held at St. Paul's Church on Wednesday, Jan. 26, Wilson said sometimes teach contradictions. He cited the example of the father who teaches morality to his children, yet at the same time brings home a copy of "Playboy".

notion that young people are more honest than their parents, "Young people pretend to be honest, because they feel their parents want them to play that type of role. There's a tendency by children to react in a way they expect their parents and teachers expect them to behave." Old ways, new problems


The problems of parenthood are more complex than ever before, Wilson explained.

"Parents in general are having difficulties, maybe because no one taught them to be good parents. No one ever took a course to be a good parent." The teachings of the 1940's aren't adaptable to parental problems of the 1970's, added Wilson.

Teaching children to have a set of worthwhile values is an extremely tough challenge, noted the speaker. "You're up against the values of society—a society of materialistic self-centredness."

"There is no such thing as teenage rebellion," suggested Wilson. "When children are young they have to follow their parents' dictates. As young children become teenagers they have a better chance to assert their independance. Teenage Wilson took issue with the rebellion is just unresolved notion that young people are childhood problems."

Wilson remarked that parents all too often will not let their children have a frustration safety valve. "It's difficult to deal with negative emotions. Some parents who are not able to deal with their angry children come out with 'that's enough, go to bed.' They'll obey you because you're bigger than they are and you're the

Positive approach "Instead of asking your child a negative question, such as 'did you behave at school today?' why not ask him: 'what was a beautiful sight today and how did it affect you?' "Wilson told his audience.

A straight-forward, honest approach to the matters of sex by

parents, was advocated by Wilson. "Why not teach young children to have a healthy attitude to sex, instead of trying to hide if from them?"

This hidden approach to sex causes several contradictions. Wilson says he finds conflicting attitudes among the college students he teaches. "Many of

these students shack up with their opposite numbers on the weekend, but if you try to conduct a talk on pre-martial sex in the class, they become very uptight.
If they feel there is nothing wrong with pre-maritial sex why are they afraid to discuss it?"

Two lives Young people tend to live double lives, reasoned Wilson-"the life they want to live when they're away from their parents. say at college, and the life they feel their parents want them to adopt when they're home." Wilson also said young people in their late teens and early 20's have considerable emotional problems. "They have several

conflicting values to deal with.

A good marriage lends itself to a happy family, said Wilson as he outlined his program for a healthy family life. "A family has to have love, the family has to be concerned about the need for improvement and the husband and wife have to support and

strengthen each other."

Wilson also cautioned his audience about the need for parents showing their love to their children. "It doesn't matter if you love children, because if you can't show them this affection, you might as well not love them," he concluded.
