Consider establishing local coin car wash

Milton Planning Board will make a decision at their March meeting concerning the approval or disapproval of a car wash being established in the downtown core.

Mr. Worth representing A.L.D. Canada Limited, told planners the firm held a 15 year lease on land on Commercial St. property owned by Brian Best. The establishment if built would be operated by Diago Caruso.

Mr. Worth explained the car wash would have four stalls for washing and two vacuum units 20 cars. He said there was a possibility of installing gas pumps at a later date.

Reeve Ron Harris and Syd Childs agreed the establishment would be a poor use of prime land. The reeve wondered if the planners would have any say about the establishment if

pumps were installed with the car wash.

Currently the official plans allow an automobile service station in a C-1 or core area while it does not allow a car wash. Mr. Worth was asking permission to build there.

Planners agreed they would consult the Chief of Police concerning his comments about traffic patterns in that area and how they would be effected by the development.

Weigh it well

IMPRESSIONS OF FLORIDA
An item in this week's Orlando Sentinel gives us an example that might well be followed by boards of education everywhere.

"In Duval County (Jacksonville) and four other cities an experimental program is aimed at rewarding effective teachers whose imagination and hard work pay off in demonstrable results.

"The \$770,000 grant from the U.S. Office of Education will let a teacher pick up \$100 extra a month — if he or she is good enough.

"The teacher who raises classes to a specified level of improvement gets the extra money; the teacher who falls short still gets regular pay.

"We have long felt the brilliant and imaginative teacher should be paid what he's worth. As it is, we are losing many of the best young men and women to business and industry.

"The present system for the most part rewards those who accumulate seniority and add summer college credits.

"The 'born teacher' who finds a way to reach and impress his youngsters, often leaves teaching because it is neither challenging enough nor financially rewarding enough.

"The system is held together by the average competent teacher who works hard day after day and doesn't rock the boat—and we aren't giving these teachers bad marks.

"Yet if a fair and accurate yardstick of pupil achievement can be attained, teachers should welcome the merit pay challenge. Their professionalism would be sharpened. They would know somebody higher up cares and is looking in. They'd know further they would not be penalized for being average but could be rewarded for meeting the challenge of the classroom."

We remember this system was used when the "little red schoolhouse" was in operation, except that when a teacher couldn't produce she was replaced—and no doubt that's why so many famous people came out of that same schoolhouse.

We hope our many progressive boards of education in Ontario will soon try out this "old-new" system.

COST OF LIVING

The price of groceries down here is not much different than at home but if you eat out the cost is most reasonable. We were invited to join a family of friends on their weekly outing last Friday night and at one of the popular cafeterias I chose for my dinner grilled chopped sirloin steak, a serving of sweet potatoes, a devilled egg, a square of corn bread, a piece of custard pie and a glass of milk. The total price including tax was \$1.68. Even when you take a good sized serving of roast beef the cost is only a bit over \$2.
