Weigh it well

The supermarket where we like to buy our groceries has this sign on the door: "Closed Sundays — See you in Church." So we went to church. After the first hymn we were surprised when friendly hands reached out to shake ours and warm, drawing voices said, "Glad you'll all come — nice to have you with us — hope you'll all come back again." We went back — to church and to Adult Bible class and to a covered dish supper (like our pot luck). And what a supper! Huge platters of fried chicken as only southern cooks know how to fry it, sweet potatoes, salads, other tasty casseroles and desserts unending. Everyone took their own dishes and cutlery and sat by families, but the food was placed on one long table to be shared by all.

Down the centre of each of the four long tables marched a colorful line of camellias, accented by a bowlful of azaleas in the middle — all from one man's garden. So we feasted our eyes as well as filled our tummies.

Then to give us something to think about we heard a missionary, former minister at the Zellwood church, home on furlough, tell of their work in the Philippines where they have been working for 25 years. They have four more years to put in, then hope to retire to Zellwood, where they bought a plot of land many years ago.

On the World Day of Prayer we attended morning service at Mt. Dora United Methodist Church. It was the first time I'd ever attended any other service than our home one on that day, the first time in a big church for that event and the first time I'd seen the service attended by men. Of course there are many hundreds of couples wintering here and most of them are in their retirement years. But I've always wondered why, in the first place, men were not included in the World Day of Prayer service. Isn't it their duty to offer prayers for our world neighbours, too?

Men are very much to the fore in the life of the church down here — leading and teaching in the Sunday School or singing in the choir, while many others attend with their small families. Church is a very real part of family life here.
